St. Paul's Church National Historic Site is one of nearly 400 National Parks across the country and one of 23 special destinations in the 10 parks that make up the National Parks of New York Harbor.

Cemetery Scavenger Hunt

The answers to these questions can be found in the historic cemetery at St. Paul's Church.

I. Walk into the cemetery by taking the path around the right (western) side of the church. Look at the side of the church, just over the door, for the cornerstone. What year do you see?





- 2. As you walk around toward the back of the church, look for a metal plaque that is titled, "In Memory of the Patriots of the American Revolution Who Lie Buried in this Churchyard." How many soldiers are named on the plaque?
- 3. Walk around to the back of the church, and look at the tall windows. How many panes of glass go across a single row?
- 4. Walk a few rows back, and look for a sandstone (brownish red) grave marker for an officer in the American army during the Revolutionary War who died in 1786 at the age of 32. The design at the top is called the Trophy of Arms. What is his last name?





Did You Know?

The cemetery at St. Paul's Church contains 8,000 burials. The earliest date from the beginning of the 18th Century. In addition, the cemetery is the final resting place of local soldiers from every war America participated in up through World War II.

5. Look for another sandstone grave marker — just one row behing the one in Question 4 — with a skull and crossbones. What is the last name of the woman buried there?



6. Walk to the right (west) about 30 yards and locate a large underground burial vault.
What is the name of the family buried there?



7. Just to the left (facing the rear of the cemetery) of the vault from Question 6 is a granite stone marker for the Benson family. How many people are buried there?

Did You Know?

St. Paul's Church served as a field hospital following a Revolutionary War battle. Hessian and American soldiers are buried in the churchyard.

During the Revolutionary War, Hessian troops seized the original wooden church and tore it down for firewood.

Experience Your America...


