

PHYSICIAN PLEASE READ.

This affidavit is for use under Act of March 6, 1896, which provides that pensions under the act of June 27, 1890, shall date from the time of filing the first application, provided the evidence in the case shall show a pensionable disability to have existed, or to exist at the time of filing such first application, &c.

that he has been a practicing physician for 24 years, and has been acquainted with said soldier for about twenty seven years; that he has given him treatment and had knowledge of him and his disability as follows: I have attended Wm Holland as his physician for more than 22 years about the year 1884 (or 1885) I attended him for injuries received by being thrown from a wagon (or cart). The injuries were of serious character. The two bones were broken. The right shoulder, arm and hand were badly sprained and bruised and the left ankle sprained and probably fractured causing lameness which has continued from that time on. His suffering and disabilities have continued from that date until the present time, during all of which time he has been unable to work & earn a support by manual labor. He was a broken down, feeble old man at the time he received the injuries.



State of _____, before me, _____, a special examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared.

The pensioner _____, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this special examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says:

I am 78 years of age; my post-office address is as above; I have mostly worked round the cemetery.

I enlisted at Pulaski, Tenn. and was mustered in at South Trestle, Ala. in Co. I. 111th U.S. Inf. in March, 1864. I struck and was discharged at Nashville, Tenn. in May, 1864.

I worked at farming before I enlisted. I belonged to Benjamin Harlin of Marry Co. Tenn. Everybody calls me Holland, but the right proper name I reckon is Harlin. I went by the name of Holland all the time in the Army and have not had any other name since the time I was captured at South Trestle, Ala. and was turned over to Dr. James Brown, chief surgeon of Forest's staff for a waterman and did not get back to my own company until after Wood's raid. I never belonged to any other company or regiment than Co. I. 111th U.S. Inf.

When I enlisted I told my captain I was about 40 odd years old, but he said I wasn't so old and put me down about 30 or 35. I was born at Haydensville, Todd Co. Ky. I was measured 5 feet 3 inches tall. (Certificate of discharge exhibited gives him 5 feet 3 inches tall, dark complexion, dark eyes, dark hair, occupation, farmer born in Todd Co. Ky. 32 years of age at enlistment - which seems to agree with his present appearance - Examined.)
