This regiment was organized at Camp Moore on September 29, 1861, with 851 men. The regiment moved to New Orleans and spent the winter at Camp Benjamin. In February, 1862, the regiment went to Corinth, Mississippi, as part of General Daniel Ruggles' brigade. The regiment took 330 men into the Battle of Shiloh, April 6, and

suffered 90 casualties during the attack. On May 9, the men fought in an engagement at Farmington, Mississippi; 14 men were killed or wounded. The regiment was part of General Daniel W. Adams' Louisiana brigade during the invasion of Kentucky, August–October. On October 8, the men participated in the Battle of Perryville and apparently had few casualties. The army went into winter quarters at Tullahoma, Tennessee. Near there, General Braxton Bragg consolidated the regiment into five companies and merged it with the 25th Louisiana Regiment on November 30, 1862. Even though the officers of both regiments were part of a new unit, they received promotions as though they were still in their original regiments. On February 3, 1865, the consolidated unit was broken up, and the remnants of the 16th Louisiana were combined with those of the 1st Louisiana Regulars and 20th Louisiana Regiment. The men fought in the Siege of Spanish Fort, Alabama, March 27–April 8. Following the evacuation of Mobile, the men of the 16th Louisiana were placed in a new consolidated unit called the Chalmette Regiment; they surrendered with it at Gainesville on May 8.

This regiment was formed at Shelbyville, Tennessee, on November 30, 1862, with an aggregate strength of 1,078 men. The regiment participated in the attacks on December 31, 1862, and January 2, 1863, during the Battle of Murfreesboro and suffered 438 casualties. With its brigade, the regiment joined General Joseph E. Johnston's army at Jackson, Mississippi, in May, 1863. At Jackson, the men played a part in the siege of July 5 to 25 and suffered a small number of casualties. The brigade returned to the Army of Tennessee in time to fight in the Battle of Chickamauga, September 19–20. There the regiment lost nearly one-third of its men as prisoners to the enemy. The men fought in the Battle of Missionary Ridge, November 25, and spent

the winter at Dalton, Georgia. During the Atlanta Campaign, the regiment fought at Mill Creek Gap, May 7; Resaca, May 14–15; and New Hope Church, May 25–28. In those engagements, 63 men were killed, wounded, or missing. The men participated in the battles of Atlanta, July 22; Ezra Church, July 28; and Jonesboro, August 31. On October 30, the regiment captured the Federal garrison at Florence, Alabama. The men fought in the Battle of Nashville, December 15–16, during the army's invasion of Tennessee. In February, 1865, while at Mobile, Alabama, the regiment was broken up. The remnants of the 16th Louisiana were consolidated with the 1st Louisiana Regulars and 20th Louisiana as a new unit. The men of the 25th Louisiana were merged with those of the 4th Louisiana Battalion.

23 of the regiment's men were killed, 84 were wounded, and 20 were missing. Retreating with the army to Corinth, the regiment was disbanded on June 3 by General Braxton Bragg at the expiration of its enlistment. Most of the men went into the 18th Louisiana Regiment. On September 17, the War Department reorganized the regiment and ordered it to report to General Richard Taylor in south Louisiana. The reorganization occurred at New Iberia on October 16, when Colonel McPheeters reclaimed the men serving with the 18th Louisiana. On October 27, the regiment fought in the Battle of La-badeville and retreated with the army to the lower Bayou Teche. After spending several weeks at Bisland, the men moved to Avery Island on December 19. The regiment went to Butte a la Rose on January 11, 1863. On February 16, Companies F, G, and H, while on picket on the Grand River, fired on and drove off the enemy steamer *Grey Cloud*. The regiment returned to Bisland on April 7 and fought in the battle there on April 12 and 13. Retreating with Taylor's army through Opelousas and Alexandria to Natchitoches, the regiment returned to south Louisiana in June. The men garrisoned Brashear City in June and July while the army conducted operations on Bayou Lafourche. During the next three months, the regiment marched with General Alfred Mouton's brigade back and forth across south Louisiana. On November 3, the 11th and 12th Louisiana Infantry battalions were added to the regiment at Simmesport to form the Consolidated Crescent Regiment.

This regiment was organized March 26, 1862, at New Orleans with 1,018 men. Ordered to Corinth, Mississippi, the regiment traveled by steamer to Memphis and from there by train to its destination. The men arrived at Corinth on April 11 and later marched to Monterey, Tennessee. During the operations around Corinth the next month, the regiment participated in several skirmishes. On May 9, the men saw their first battle at Farmington, at which 2 men were killed and 29 were wounded. The regiment's brigade commander wrote that the men "behaved like veterans" during the engagement. When Corinth was evacuated, the regiment marched to Tupelo and remained in camp there until August. The men then went with the army on its invasion of Kentucky and fought in the Battle of Perryville, October 8. On November 30, the regiment was consolidated into five companies and united with the 16th Louisiana Regiment to form the 16th and 25th Louisiana Consolidated Regiment. This unit was

broken up on February 3, 1865, and the men of the 25th Louisiana were merged with those of the 4th Louisiana Battalion. They fought in the Siege of Spanish Fort near Mobile, Alabama, March 27–April 8. After the evacuation of Mobile, the 25th was consolidated again. Companies A, B, E, G, I, and K became Company B, and Companies C, D, F, and H became Company C, Pelican Regiment. This unit surrendered at Gainesville on May 8.

This regiment was organized at Camp Lovell, Berwick City, on April 3, 1862, with eight companies and 805 men. Several weeks later, the regiment went to New Orleans, where two additional companies joined it. At the evacuation of the Crescent City, the regiment went by railroad to Camp Moore. The men moved to Jackson, Mississippi, on May 6 and spent the next two weeks there and at Edwards' Depot. On May 19, they went to Vicksburg and performed picket duty during the opening stages of the first Federal attack on the city. The regiment returned to Edwards' Depot on June 18 and remained there through the summer. In September, the regiment once again went into camp at Vicksburg. The men participated in the defense of Chickasaw Bluffs, December 25–29. They captured more than 300 enemy soldiers in an attack on the enemy's flank on December 29. In the last week of March, 1863, the regiment traveled to Deer Creek in northeast Mississippi and was entrenched there in anticipation of an enemy attack. During the Siege of Vicksburg, May 19–July 4, the regiment served in the trenches on the left flank of the Confederate lines. The men went home on parole after the surrender of the garrison. Some men began gathering in a parole camp at Pineville in June, 1864. After being declared exchanged in August, more men reported to the camp during the closing months of the year. Many men did not report for duty after being exchanged but remained at their homes. As part of General Allen Thomas' brigade, the regiment did picket and guard duty at Fort Buhlow and Fort Randolph near Pineville. The men continued this duty until late April, 1865. At that time, the brigade moved to a camp on Bayou Cotle. The men spent a few days there and marched to Camp Sa
