

Private Mathias Mathiasen

Private Mathias Mathiasen of Norway, Racine County, enlisted under Captain Berg on 11 October 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 22 years old and single.

He was killed in the Battle of Stones River on 31 December 1862.

Private Paul Mathiasen

Private Paul Mathiasen of Raymond, Racine County, enlisted under Captain Berg on 4 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 18 years old and single.

He was left behind in Perryville, Kentucky, on 9 October 1862; was sick in Daneville, Kentucky; was taken prisoner at Stones River on the following 31 December (was reported killed); was sent to St. Louis to be exchanged; was wounded at Chickamauga on 19 September 1863; was in Albany, Indiana, because of his wounds on the following 21 October; and was mustered out with the company.

Private Darwin Mirrill

Private Darwin Mirrill at Waterford enlisted under Captain Berg on 4 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 16 years old and single.

He was taken prisoner in La Vergne on 29 December 1862; was sent back on parole, but it was invalid; was therefore sent back into the lines at Murfreesboro on 13 January 1863; was sick in Nashville on the following 19 September; and was mustered out with the company.

Private Andrew Moe

Private Andrew Moe of Dane County enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 21 October 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 23 years old and single.

He was transferred to Company E pursuant to Colonel Heg's orders on 1 May 1862, became unfit for service, and was discharged in Murfreesboro on 19 May 1863.

Private Hans Nielsen

Private Hans Nielsen of Raymond, Wisconsin, enlisted under Captain Berg on 21 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 42 years old and single.

He was left behind in Iuka on 21 August 1862 because of illness, died there of disease on the following 5 September, and is buried in Corinth.

Private Henrick Nielsen

Private Henrick Nielsen of Raymond, Wisconsin, enlisted under Captain Berg on 26 December 1861 and was mustered in on 6 January 1862 in Madison. He was 18 years old and single.

He was sick in Bowling Green on 17 September 1862; was taken prisoner at Stones River on 31 December that year; was a prisoner of war on parole in St. Louis and in Columbus, Ohio; and was transferred to the Veteran Reserve Corps on 19 August 1863.

Private Jacob Nielsen

Private Jacob Nielsen of Norway, Racine County, enlisted under Captain Berg on 5 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 43 years old and married.

He died on Island Number 10 on 23 June 1862 and is buried in the Mississippi River Cemetery near Memphis.

Private Lars Nielsen

Private Lars Nielsen of Raymond enlisted under Captain Berg on 15 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 23 years old and single.

He was sick on Island Number 10 on 16 June 1862; was taken prisoner at Stones River; was exchanged; was sick in Chattanooga from 28 January 1863 and died there on the following 3 December; and is buried on the national cemetery there in section D, grave number 890.

Private Niels Nielsen

Private Niels Nielsen of Raymond enlisted under Captain Berg on 9 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 33 years old and single.

He was sick on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862 and was given leave, but he stayed away a month too long. According to the Madison hospital list he was mustered out there on 10 December 1862.

Private Laurentz Olson

Private Laurentz Olson of Milwaukee enlisted under Captain Berg on 12 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 27 years old and single.

He was sick in Union City on 20 June 1862; was seriously wounded at Stones River on the following 30 December and was sent to Nashville; became unfit for service; and was discharged in Louisville, Kentucky, on 13 May 1863.

Sergeant Ole Olson

Sergeant Ole Olson of Norway, Racine County, enlisted under Captain Berg on 9 October 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 34 years old and single.

He was sick in St. Louis on 4 March 1862; deserted from Island Number 10 on the following 1 June; was heard from sick in Evansville, Indiana; was unfit for service; and was discharged on 14 November of that year.

Private Ole Oleson

Private Ole Oleson of Norway, Racine County, enlisted under Captain Berg on 5 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 17 years old and single.

He was with the Pioneer Corps in November 1862 and was mustered out with the company.

Private Thore Oleson

Private Thore Oleson of Milwaukee enlisted under Captain Berg on 8 October 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 31 years old and single.

He was sick in Murfreesboro on 24 June 1863; was left behind in Bella Valley, Alabama, on 9 September that year because of illness; was sick at Wisen's Gap on the same day; was a prisoner of war on 19 September; was back in Chattanooga on the following 24 December, but sick; and was mustered out with the company.

Private Bernt C. Osmondson

Private Bernt C. Osmondson of Norway, Racine County, enlisted under —— Trowbridge [*sic*] on 30 August 1862 and was mustered in the next day in Madison. He was 19 years old and a sailor.

He was seriously wounded at Stones River on 30 December 1862 and died of his wounds on 9 January 1863.

Private Fries J. Osmundson

Private Fries J. Osmundson of Norway, Racine County, enlisted under Captain Berg on 28 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 22 years old and single.

He was given leave in Cincinnati, Ohio, became unfit for service, and was discharged on 23 June 1863.

Corporal James Overson

Corporal and Brevet Captain James Overson of Norway, Racine County, enlisted under Captain Berg on 5 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 23 years old and single.

He was wounded at Chickamauga on 19 September 1863 and was sent to Chattanooga and then to Madison, Wisconsin. He became unfit for service and was discharged there on 9 August 1864. He was named brevet captain on 20 August 1867, effective from 20 September 1863, for the bravery he displayed during the Battle of Chickamauga where he took up a position at the front of his company when his captain was killed and encouraged his comrades to hold their position even though they were hard pressed. It was then that he was wounded.

Private George Page

Private George Page of Waterford enlisted under Captain Berg on 25 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 23 years old and single.

He was sick on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862, became unfit for service, and was discharged in Jacinto on the following 25 July.

Private Levi Page

Private Levi Page of Waterford enlisted under Captain Berg on 4 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 20 years old and single.

He was a wagoner with the division supply transport on 20 June and 1 July 1863 and served in the quartermaster corps for a while in between these two dates. He was mustered out with the company.

Private Christian Petersen

Private Christian Petersen of Raymond, Wisconsin, enlisted under Captain Berg on 4 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 18 years old and single.

He was sick on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862; was left behind because of illness in Corinth on the following 21 June; became unfit for service; and was discharged in Cincinnati on 11 October that year.

Private Ole Petersen

Private Ole Petersen, the elder, of Norway, Racine County, enlisted under Captain Berg on 14 October 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 28 years old and single.

He was with the Pioneer Corps on 26 and 29 November 1862 and was mustered out with the company.

Private Ole Petersen

Private Ole Petersen, the younger, of Racine enlisted under Captain Berg on 14 October 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 21 years old and single.

He was sick in Bowling Green on 17 September 1862, was sick in the hospital in Murfreesboro on 16 March 1863, and died there of disease on the following 19 April. He is buried in the national cemetery at Stones River, section ^M ~~X~~, grave number ⁴⁹¹⁴ 91; he was transported there from Murfreesboro.

Private William Reeves

Private William Reeves of Madison enlisted under Captain Berg on 15 February 1862 and was mustered in on the same day. He was 29 years old and single.

He became unfit for service and was discharged on Island Number 10 on 22 May 1862.

Private Edwin A. Rice

Private Edwin A. Rice of Waterford enlisted under J. L. Rice on 4 January 1864 and was mustered in on 17 February in Madison. He was 44 years old.

He joined the company at Strawberry Plains on the following 31 March; was transferred to Company H at Whiteside; was then transferred to the 24th Infantry; and from there was transferred to Company K in the 13th Infantry on 10 June 1865.

Quartermaster Sergeant J. L. Rice

Quartermaster Sergeant J. L. Rice of Waterford enlisted under Captain Berg on 5 February 1862 and was mustered in on the 25th in Madison. He was 39 years old and married.

He was transferred to the Staff as quartermaster sergeant on 1 March 1863; was transferred back to the company as a private on 23 December 1864; and was mustered out with the company.

Private Lewis Rolfson

Private Lewis Rolfson of Norway, Racine County, enlisted under Captain Berg on 14 December 1861 and was mustered in on 1 January 1862. He was 22 years old and single.

He was left behind because of illness in Manchester, Tennessee, on 1 July 1863; went missing in the Battle of Chickamauga (prisoner of war?); and was mustered out with the company.

Private J. Simonsen

Private John Simonsen of Norway, Racine County, enlisted under Captain Berg on 10 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 20 years old and single.

He was sick in Bowling Green in September 1862 and was killed at Chickamauga on 19

September 1863.

Private Peter Söderberg

Private Peter Söderberg of Waterford enlisted under J. L. Rice on 31 December 1863 and was mustered in on 28 January 1864 in Madison. He was 35 years old.

He joined the company at Strawberry Plains; was transferred to Company 145, 2nd Battery of the Veteran Reserve Corps on 6 April 1864; and was mustered out in Nashville on 26 August 1865.

Private Hans C. Sørenson

Private Hans C. Sørenson of Whitewater enlisted under Captain Berg on 25 October 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 34 years old and single.

He was sick on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862; was given leave on the 12th; was in Pine Lake, Wisconsin, but stayed away too long; was wounded at Chickamauga on 19 September 1863 and was sent to the hospital, was then sent to Madison, Wisconsin; and because of his wounds was discharged from Harvey Hospital there on 28 December 1864. He is entered on the Roll of Honor for the 2nd Brigade, 1st Division, 20th Army Corps.

Private Peter Sørenson

Private Peter Sørenson of Raymond, Racine County, enlisted under Colonel Heg on 29 November 1862 and was mustered in on 5 December in Madison. He was 42 years old.

He was sick in Wilson Valley in September 1863; was sick at Winson's Gap; died of chronic diarrhea in the general hospital in Nashville on 17 November that year; and is buried in the cemetery there, section [✓]D, grave number ³⁵⁴~~597~~.

Private Peter E. Stangeland

Private Peter E. Stangeland of Norway, Racine County, enlisted under Captain Berg on 4 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 43 years old and married.

He was wounded at Chickamauga on 19 September 1863; likewise at Resaca on 14 May 1864; and was mustered out with the company.

Private Erick E. Steensby

Private Erick E. Steensby of Norway, Racine County, enlisted under Captain Berg on 31 October 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 41 years old and married.

He served on military police duty on 20 December 1862; was sick in the hospital in Murfreesboro on 16 and 26 March 1863; and was mustered out with the company.

Private Lars Stianson

Private Lars Stianson of Milwaukee enlisted under Captain Berg on 19 October 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 27 years old and single.

He was sick in Bowling Green on 17 September 1862 and died in Louisville on the following 9 November. He is buried there in Cave Hill Cemetery, row 2, section 13, grave number 10.

Private Ole Storland

Private Ole Storland of Madison enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 29 December 1861 and was mustered in on 6 January 1862. He was 19 years old and single.

Pursuant to Colonel Heg's orders he was transferred to Company E on Island Number 10 on 1 May 1862; served as an escort with the provision transport from Stevenson on 13 October 1863; was absent because of illness on 18 July 1864; and was mustered out with Company E.

Private Emanuel Swenson

Private Emanuel Swenson of Norway, Racine County, enlisted under Captain Berg on 7 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 26 years old and single.

He died in the hospital in Chattanooga on 29 November 1863 and is buried in the national cemetery there, section D, grave number 744. ¹²⁶⁴⁹

Private Ole Swenson

Private Ole Swenson of Norway, Racine County, enlisted under Captain Berg on 6 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 22 years old and single.

He was a mechanic at the brigade headquarters from 1 May to 1 June 1863; was with the division's provision transport on 3 September that year; was sick in Chattanooga on the following 28 November; was a wagon maker with the ambulance corps[#] on 21 May 1864; was a mechanic at the division's headquarters on the 24th of that month; and was mustered out with the company.

Corporal Carl Torbjornson

Corporal Carl Torbjornson of Muskego enlisted under Captain Berg on 28 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 20 years old and single.

He was wounded at Chickamauga on 19 September 1863; was promoted to corporal on 7 November 1864; and was mustered out with the company. He is entered on the Roll of Honor for the 2nd Brigade, 1st Division, 20th Army Corps.

Private William Wall

Private William Wall of Waterford enlisted under Sergeant Rice on 4 January 1864 and was mustered in on the 28th in Madison. He was 18 years old.

He joined the company at Strawberry Plains on 31 March; was absent because of illness at Pine Station on the following 4 August; was transferred to Company H at Whiteside; was then transferred to the 24th Infantry; and was finally transferred to Company K in the 13th Infantry on 10 June 1865.

Corporal Edwin W. Wheeler

Corporal Edwin W. Wheeler of Waterford enlisted under Captain Berg on 25 October 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 29 years old and single.

He was absent serving as a butcher with Captain Fourke on 1 September 1863; was sick in Chattanooga on the following 28 November; was wounded at Resaca on 14 May 1864; and was mustered out with the company.

Musician Henry F. Whitcomb

Musician Henry F. Whitcomb of Waterford enlisted under Captain Berg on 12 November 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 42 years old and married.

He became unfit for service and was discharged on Island Number 10 on 24 May 1862.

Quartermaster Sergeant Du Bartus Willard

Quartermaster Sergeant Du Bartus Willard of Waterford enlisted under —— Upham on 30 August 1862 and was mustered in on the same day in Madison. He was 31 years old.

He was serving on the brigade staff on 1 March 1863, and in the same place as an orderly on 1 June of that year; was temporarily a clerk on the brigade staff in May; served with the division supply train on the following 3 September; served again on the brigade staff on 6 and 26 November; was transferred to the Staff as quartermaster sergeant on 24 December 1864; and was transferred to Company H, where he served out his term of service.

Wagon Master Victor M. Willard

Wagon master Victor M. Willard of Waterford enlisted under Captain Berg on 31 October 1861 and was mustered in on 2 December in Madison. He was 45 years old and married.

He deserted on 2 March 1862, but was back with the company on the following 4 June; was in the quartermaster corps on Island Number 10 on the 11th; was sick in Iuka on the following 28 August; was sick in Bowling Green on 17 September; became unfit for service; and was discharged on 23 October 1862 in Louisville, Kentucky.

Private Thomas O. Wool

Private Thomas O. Wool of Ossian, Iowa, enlisted under Captain Berg on 16 February 1862 and was mustered in on the 19th in Madison. He was 29 years old and single.

He was absent without leave in November 1862; deserted from the hospital in Cave City, Kentucky, on 31 March 1863; and has not been heard from since (in the War Department).

This company was mustered out in Chattanooga, Tennessee, on 1 January 1865.

Company D

Term of service: 3 years

Captain Charles Campbell

Captain Charles Campbell of Waupun received his commission on 15 January 1862 and was mustered in on the following 13 February in Madison. He was 45 years old and married.

He was given leave and was home in Waupun from 30 March to 30 April 1862. He sent in his resignation on 27 March and this was accepted by General Halleck on the following 20 April. Therefore, he was not with the 15th after their operations actually began.

Captain Albert Skofstad

Captain Albert Skofstad of Waterford received his commission as 1st lieutenant on 15 January 1862, effective from the 14th. He was 23 years old and single.

He was promoted to captain on the following 30 April, effective from the 20th; was inspector with the 3rd Brigade on 2 May 1863 and was relieved of this duty on the following 22 October; was absent without leave on 21 September that year; was sick in Chattanooga on the following 28 November; was inspector in the 1st Brigade, 3rd Division, 4th Army Corps on 20 February 1864; and resigned on the following 2 March. His resignation was accepted by General Schofield.

Captain Skofstad was born in Norway to Johannes and Bertha Skofstad on 2 July 1839. He came to America with his parents in 1841 and they settled in Norway, Racine County, Wisconsin. In 1859 Albert moved to Waupun and received a commission at the State Prison, where Colonel Heg was commissioner. As brigade inspector[#] Captain Skofstad was well-liked, and he dealt with matters to the satisfaction of both his superiors and his subordinates. After

the war he moved to Iowa, where he has held several positions of honor. Conscientious, but cheerful, with the manners of a gentleman—and we have Albert Skofstad.

Captain Lewis G. Nilson

Captain Lewis G. Nilson of Oconomowoc enlisted as a private under Captain Campbell on 30 October 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 20 years old and single.

He was named sergeant on 1 January 1862; received his commission as 1st lieutenant on the following 30 April, effective from the 20th; was acting quartermaster on the following 24 November; was left behind with the supply train in this capacity at Nashville in December of that year; was acting adjutant on 1 May 1863; was promoted to adjutant on 1 June 1863, effective from 27 May; was on detached service and appointed as aide-de-camp on the brigade staff; was a captain in 1864 in special service as provost marshal; and was mustered out with the company.

Captain Nilson was born on the Naas farm in Drangedal, Norway, on 9 May 1841 and came to America with his parents, Gunder Nilson and Aasborg Naas, in 1845. They settled in the Rock River Settlement in Dodge County, Wisconsin. At the age of 17 he was employed as a clerk in a manufacturing business and he remained here until he went off to war. After the war he moved to Kasson, Minnesota, where he had a successful business. In 1893 he was living in Owatonna, Minnesota.

1st Lieutenant Christian E. Tandberg

First Lieutenant Christian E. Tandberg of Oconomowoc received his commission as 2nd lieutenant on 15 January 1862, effective from the 14th. He was 32 years old and married.

He was on detached service at Bird's Point, Missouri, from 14 to 31 March 1862; was given leave for 20 days starting on 14 May that year; was then sick at home in Oconomowoc; was taken prisoner at Stones River on 31 December 1862 and was sent to Atlanta as a prisoner of war; was exchanged and sent back into service on 24 April 1863; was promoted to 1st lieutenant on the following 3 June, effective from 27 May; had leave in August of that year, but stayed away too long; was wounded in the left hand at Chickamauga on 19 September 1863 and was sent to the hospital; and resigned on the following 30 October because he had become unfit for service. An official notice from the War Department dated 24 September 1889 shows that he was mustered out "under the provisions of the act approved and the acts amendatory thereof." Therefore, there must be a mistake regarding the resignation, which was probably corrected through the pension bureau.

1st Lieutenant Nils G. Tufte

First Lieutenant Nils G. Tufte of Pine Lake enlisted under Captain Campbell on 10 December 1861 and was mustered in on the — in Madison. He was 29 years old and single.

He was named corporal on 1 January 1862; was named sergeant on the following 1 May; served in the commissary as a wagon master on 6 November that year; was promoted to 2nd lieutenant on 3 June 1863, effective from 27 May; was temporary commander of Company E in 1864; was in special service as commander of the Regiment's Pioneer Company in May of that year; was promoted to 1st lieutenant —; and was mustered out with the company.

Nils Tufte was born on 1834 in Gjerpen parish near Skien, Norway. His parents, Gregorius Nilsen and Maren Gurine Tufte, came to America in 1844 and Nils was with them. They settled at Pine Lake, Wisconsin. At the age of 15 he went to sea—mostly on the Great Lakes—and continued with that until he enlisted in the 15th. He was a brave and respected

soldier and a capable officer, one of the best in the Regiment. After the war he was a farmer in Pine Lake. He died several years ago.

2nd Lieutenant Ivar A. Brandt

Second Lieutenant Ivar A. Brandt of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 30 October 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 27 years old and single.

He was named corporal on 1 January 1862 and was named sergeant on the following 1 May; was seriously wounded at Stones River on 31 December that year and was sent to the hospital in Nashville, later to the camp at Dennison, Ohio; was mustered out with the company; and was named 2nd lieutenant on 25 February 1867, effective from 31 August 1864.

Ivar Brandt is from Valdres, Norway. He was a brave soldier under all conditions and was promoted to higher positions, but he did not know how to behave as if he were better than the others. He was a conscientious, precise, and capable soldier who regarded a volunteer private as the equal of a volunteer officer. In 1893 he was living in Decorah, Iowa.

Noncommissioned Officers and Privates

Private Byron Alby

Private Byron (Bjørn?) Alby of Bloomfield, Walworth County, enlisted under Captain Campbell on 17 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 19 years old and single.

He was given leave and was sick in Berlin, Wisconsin, from 30 March until 30 April 1863; was still at home after his leave was up because he was expecting a discharge, but was arrested as a deserter and delivered to Colonel D. J. Dill in Madison, Wisconsin; was sent to the

camp; was sick in the hospital on 2 July 1864; and was mustered out with the company.

According to official records from the War Department dated 14 April 1887, the accusation against him that he was a deserter was dropped.

Private Martin Anderson

Private Martin Anderson of Moscow, Iowa County, enlisted under Captain Campbell on 11 February 1862 and was mustered in on the 13th in Madison. He was 45 years old and married.

He was sick on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862, became unfit for service and was discharged on the following 15 July.

Private Arne Arneson

Private Arne Arneson of Mt. Horeb, Wisconsin, enlisted under Captain Campbell on 15 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 16th in Madison. He was 22 years old and married.

He was wounded and taken prisoner at Stones River; was exchanged; was sick in Chattanooga on 28 November 1863; was sick in Nashville on 15 June 1864; and was mustered out with the company.

Private Jabus Barr

Private Jabus Barr of Bloomfield, Walworth County, enlisted under Captain Campbell on 17 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 19 years old and single.

He was sick in Bowling Green on 4 November 1862; was sick in Knoxville on 15 February 1864; was sick in Chattanooga; was sick in Keokuk, Iowa, on 15 June 1864; and was later sick in Madison, where he was mustered out on the following 12 December.

Sergeant Ole M. Bendigon (Bendikson?)

Sergeant and Brevet Captain Ole M. Bendigon (Bendikson?) of Columbia County enlisted under Captain Campbell on 27 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 28 years old and single.

He was named sergeant on 1 December 1862; was wounded at Chickamauga on 19 September 1863 and was sent to Nashville; was home in Wisconsin in 1864; was mustered out with the company; and was named brevet captain on 24 January 1867 in recognition of the bravery he displayed at Perryville. Here he was sick in the hospital. But when he heard that the Regiment was going into action he got permission from the surgeon to be with the company during the battle. He immediately grabbed his rifle and reported for duty. In 1893 he was living in Lewiston, Wisconsin.

Private John Bever

Private John Bever of New Lisbon, Juneau County, enlisted under Captain Campbell on 28 October 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 22 years old and single.

He became unfit for service and was discharged in the camp at Murfreesboro on 9 April 1863.

Private Christian I. Bjørneby

Private Christian Ingebret Bjørneby of Strongs Prairie, Adams County, enlisted under — on 2 November 1861 and was mustered in on — in Madison. He was 33 years old and single.

He died in Madison on 18 February 1862.

Private Knud Bjørgulfson

Private Knud Bjørgulfson of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 17 January 1862 and was mustered in on — in Madison. He was 18 years old and single.

He was sick in the hospital in Daneville on 21 October 1862, became unfit for service, and was discharged in Louisville, Kentucky, on the following 18 December.

Sergeant Andrew A. Dahl

Sergeant Andrew A. Dahl of Lewiston, Columbia County, enlisted under Captain Campbell on 2 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 8th in Madison. He was 25 years old and married.

He was named corporal on 1 January 1862 and sergeant on the following 1 December; served with the provision transport from Stevenson on 13 October 1863; was sick in Chattanooga on 28 November 1863; and was mustered out with the company.

Musician Frank Drum

Musician Frank Drum of Madison enlisted under Captain Campbell on 21 February 1862 and was mustered in on the same day. He was 20 years old and single.

He was discharged in the camp near Corinth on 12 July 1862.

Private Andrew (J.) Dulton

^{DUTTON}
Private Andrew (J.) Dulton of Waupun enlisted under Captain Campbell on 14 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 18 years old and single.

He was sick in Murfreesboro in June and in Nashville in August 1863; died on 19 April 1864; and is buried in the cemetery in Nashville, section H, grave number ⁹⁸⁸¹685.

Sergeant Martin Fieldstad

Sergeant Martin Fieldstad (Fjelstad) of Waupun enlisted under Captain Campbell on 23 October 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 22 years old and single.

He was named sergeant on 1 January 1862; died of nervous fever in the hospital in Bowling Green on the following 18 November; and is buried in the cemetery in Nashville, section N, grave number ¹⁰⁶⁴⁹440. He was transported there from where he died.

Corporal Fergus Ferguson

Corporal Fergus Ferguson of Glenco, London District C. W., enlisted under Captain Campbell on 10 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 16th in Madison. He was 21 years old and single.

He was named corporal on 1 May 1862; was sick in Bowling Green on the following 17 September; died there of nervous fever on 1 January 1863; and was transported to the cemetery in Nashville, where he is buried in section N, grave number ¹⁰⁸⁸⁸~~679~~.

Private Ole Fredrickson

Private Ole Fredrickson of Stoughton enlisted under Captain Campbell on 15 December 1861 and was mustered in on the following day in Madison. He was 19 years old and single.

He was taken prisoner at Stones River on 31 December 1862; was a prisoner of war on parole in Annapolis, Maryland, on 28 February 1863, and the same in St. Louis; was sick in the hospital in Chattanooga on 20 October that year; had leave and was in Wisconsin on 3 May 1864; was away too long and was arrested, court-martialed, and sentenced to forfeit six months' pay; and was transferred to Company K in the 13th Infantry on 10 June 1865.

Private John Gulbrandson

Private John Gulbrandson of New Lisbon enlisted under Captain Campbell on 28 October 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 31 years old and single.

He was sick in Nashville on 26 December 1863 in the convalescent camp, 1st Division; was sick and was sent to the camp hospital from the battlefield on 19 September 1863; was sick

in the hospital in Chattanooga on the 24th of that month; likewise on the following 24 October and 28 November; and was mustered out with the company.

Corporal Christian Halvorson

Corporal Christian Halvorson of New Lisbon enlisted under Captain Campbell on 4 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 22 years old and single.

He helped to guard the baggage train on 18 October 1862; was wounded at Stones River on the following 31 December and was sent to the hospital in Nashville; was transferred to the 68th Indiana on 1 February 1864; was transferred back to the company at Strawberry Plains; was wounded at New Hope Church on 27 May 1864 (a bullet in the right arm) and was sent to the hospital in Louisville, Kentucky, and then to the Jefferson Barracks in St. Louis; was discharged because of his wounds on 2 November 1864; and is entered on the Roll of Honor for the 2nd Brigade, 1st Division, 20th Army Corps.

Private Gutorm Halvorson

Private Gutorm Halvorson of Moscow, Iowa County, enlisted under Captain Campbell on 11 February 1862 and was mustered in on the 13th in Madison. He was 49 years old and married.

He became unfit for service and was discharged on Island Number 10 on 10 May 1862.

Private Halvor Halvorson

Private Halvor Halvorson of New Lisbon enlisted under Captain Campbell on 28 October 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 26 years old and single; had brown eyes, dark hair, and a dark complexion; stood 6' tall; and was a farmer.

He was killed at Chickamauga on 19 September 1863.

Musician Halvor J. Halvorson

Musician Halvor J. Halvorson of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 30 October 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 15 years old and single.

He was sick in Nashville on 1 December 1862, became unfit for service, and was discharged on 7 January 1863.

Corporal Halvor O. Halvorson

Corporal Halvor O. Halvorson of Kilbourn City enlisted under Captain Campbell on 6 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 22 years old.

He was named corporal on 1 January 1862; had leave and was home in Kilbourn City the following 2 March; and was sick in Bowling Green on 17 September that year. However, the reports do not agree with later information: they say that he ran away from the hospital in Bowling Green on 2 July 1864 and was listed as a deserter on the following 2 August, but he produced his discharge papers in 1886 and they demonstrate that he had become unfit for service and had been discharged on 4 March 1863. Where the discharge occurred and who authorized it are not listed. He is entered in the books as a private. In 1893 he was a businessman in Stevens Point, Wisconsin.

Private Hans Halvorson

Private Hans Halvorson of Neenah enlisted under Captain Campbell on 5 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 23 years old and single.

He was temporarily appointed to serve as a wagoner for the commissary supply train; was sick in Chattanooga on 28 November 1863; was taken prisoner at New Hope Church on 27 May 1864; and was mustered out on 25 March 1865 in Madison, Wisconsin.

Private John Halvorson

Private John Halvorson of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 30 October 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 43 years old and married.

He had leave and was home in Oconomowoc from 30 March until 1 May 1862, was sick on the following 28 July, and was discharged on 22 October that year. One report says that he died that day in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Private Martin Halvorson

Private Martin Halvorson of New Lisbon enlisted under Captain Campbell on 28 October 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 19 years old and single.

He was taken prisoner at Stones River on 31 December 1862; was in Annapolis, Maryland, on parole, then in St. Louis; was transferred to the 68th Indiana on 1 February 1864; was transferred back on the following 2 April; was wounded in the right leg at Resaca on 14 May that year; and was mustered out with the company.

Private Thomas Holand

Private Thomas Holand of Port Washington, Ozaukee County, enlisted under Captain Campbell on 25 February 1862 and was mustered in on 1 March in Madison. He was 20 years old and single.

He was sick on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862, ran away on 31 March 1863, and is entered on the Rolls as a deserter. It also says there that he is dead, although no date is given.

Corporal John B. Hovland

Corporal John B. Hovland of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 11 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 19 years old and single.

He was named corporal on 1 January 1862; died Hospital Number 7 in St. Louis on the following 17 March; and is buried in the cemetery at the Jefferson Barracks, section 37, grave number 81. He was moved there from Wesleyan Cemetery.

Corporal John Hyar

Corporal John Hyar of Strongs Prairie enlisted under Captain Campbell on 28 October 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 34 years old and married.

He was sick in Chattanooga on 28 November 1863; was transferred to the 68th Indiana on 1 February 1864; was transferred back on the following 2 April; suffered a minor wound in the head at New Hope Church on 27 May 1864; and was mustered out with the company.

Private C. Ingebretson

Private Christian Ingebretson of New Lisbon enlisted under Captain Campbell on 2 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 33 years old.

He died in the general hospital in Camp Randall, Madison, on 18 February 1862.

Private Isaac Isaacson

Private Isaac Isaacson of Pine Lake enlisted under Captain Campbell on 2 November 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 36 years old and single.

He was sick in Nashville on 26 December 1862; was left behind in the convalescent camp, 1st Division; disappeared from Nashville on 26 July 1864 and is listed as a deserter with the cautionary note that he may be transferred to the Veteran Reserve Corps in February of that year. (If further information is desired, it is possible that it can be found in the V. R. C.)

Corporal Andrew L. Jacobson

Corporal Andrew L. Jacobson of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 25 November 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 24 years old and single.

He was named corporal on 1 May 1862; was left behind in Iuka on 20 August of that year because of illness; died in Chattanooga of unknown causes on 1 November 1863; and is buried there in the national cemetery, section A, grave number ~~373~~³⁷⁴.

Private Hans L. Jacobson

Private Hans L. Jacobson of Oconomowoc (?) enlisted under Captain Campbell on 30 October 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 21 years old.

He died at home in Pine Lake on 3 March 1862.

Private Jacob L. Jacobson

Private Jacob L. Jacobson of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 25 November 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 27 years old and single.

He was sick in the hospital in Iuka on 21 August 1862 and went missing in the Battle of Chickamauga on 20 September 1863, but he must have come back soon because he was with the provision transport from Stevenson on the following 13 October. He was sick in Chattanooga on 28 November that year; was transferred to the 68th Indiana on 1 February 1864; was transferred back on 2 April that year; was wounded in the left shoulder at New Hope Church on the following 27 May and was sent to the hospital in Chattanooga; was later reported sick there; was mustered out with the company; and is entered on the Roll of Honor for the 2nd Brigade, 1st Division, 20th Army Corps.

Corporal Ole Jacobson

Corporal Ole Jacobson of New Lisbon enlisted under Captain Campbell on 23 December 1861 and was mustered in on 11 January 1862 in Madison. He was 22 years old and single.

He was a guard with the baggage train on 18 August 1862; was taken prisoner at Stones River on the following 31 December, but was back on 10 January 1863; and was taken prisoner again at Chickamauga on 19 September that year and was sent to Richmond, then to Andersonville, where he died on 15 June 1864. He is buried there in grave number 2,003.

Private Lars Johnson

Private Lars Johnson of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 30 October 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 27 years old and single.

He was with the provision transport from Stevenson on 13 October 1863; was sick in Chattanooga on the following 28 November; was transferred to the 68th Indiana on 1 February 1864 and was transferred back on 2 April that year; was mustered out with the company; and is entered on the Roll of Honor, 2nd Brigade, 1st Division, 20th Army Corps.

Private Iver Joason

Private Iver Joason of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 30 October 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 20 years old and single.

He was left behind in Iuka on 20 August 1862 because of illness; died of disease in Jackson, Tennessee, on the following 4 October; and is buried in the cemetery in Corinth, Mississippi.

Private Andrew M. Johnson

Private Andrew M. Johnson of Chicago enlisted under Captain Torkildson on 27 September 1861 and was mustered in on 15 November in Madison. He was 37 years old and married.

He developed arthritis in his left knee and in one ankle, and was therefore discharged by Captain Torkildson in Camp Randall on 14 February 1862, and the discharge was accepted

by the department commander.[#] The report that he was transferred to Company A is probably a mistake because there is no such name in that company.

Private Ingebret Johnson

Private Ingebret Johnson of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 25 October 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 25 years old and single.

He was left behind in Iuka on 20 August 1862 because of illness, died of disease in the hospital in Nashville on the following 2 December, and is buried in the cemetery there.

Private John Johnson

Private John Johnson of East Troy, Walworth County, enlisted under N. Johnson on 5 February 1864 and was mustered in on the 17th in Madison. He was 18 years old.

He joined the company at Strawberry Plains; was wounded in the right arm at Kennesaw on 2 July 1864; was sick in the general hospital on the following 8 August and was sick in Louisville, Kentucky, on 2 September and in Jeffersonville, Indiana, just before that; was transferred to Company H; was then transferred to the 24th Infantry; and from there was transferred to Company I in the 13th. While he was in the 24th he was sick in the camp at Dennison, Ohio. He was mustered out pursuant to orders from Washington, D.C. on 24 May 1865 in Madison, Wisconsin, so it is possible that he was only in the 13th on paper.

Sergeant Nels Johnson

Sergeant Nels Johnson of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 25 October 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 23 years old and single.

He was named corporal on 1 January 1862; was then named sergeant on the following 1 December; served on military police duty with the brigade on 19 and 20 June 1863; was wounded at Chickamauga on 19 September that year and was sent to Nashville; was absent on recruiting

duty on 21 and 28 November 1863; was post commander at Strawberry Plains in March 1864; was acting sergeant major at Whiteside and was transferred to the Staff in accordance with orders from Colonel Johnson on 20 November 1864, effective from 15 October; and is entered on the Roll of Honor for the 2nd Brigade, 1st Division, 20th Army Corps.

Private Peder Johnson

Private Peder Johnson of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 30 October 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 22 years old and single.

He died of disease in Corinth, Mississippi, on 21 July 1862 and is buried in the cemetery there.

Private Svend Johnson

Private Svend Johnson of Chicago enlisted under Captain Gasman on 25 October 1861 and was mustered in on 15 November in Madison. He was 51 years old and married.

He was detached from the company on Island Number 10 and was with Company A for a month in April 1862; was sick in the general hospital on 28 July that year; became unfit for service; and was discharged on the following 6 October.

Private Fredrick Kammen

Private Fredrick Kammen of Mt. Horeb enlisted under Captain Campbell on 9 January 1862 and was mustered in on the 18th in Madison. He was 20 years old and single.

He was left behind on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862 because of illness and was subsequently discharged there on the following 15 July. But there is a catch here: "Said to have been discharged," it says, but there are reports which confirm the accuracy of this statement, although they differ with respect to the date.

Private Hans Kammen

Private Hans Kammen of Mt. Horeb enlisted under Captain Campbell on 9 January 1862 and was mustered in on the 18th in Madison. He was 22 years old and single.

He was left behind in Iuka on 20 August 1862 because of illness; was sick in the convalescent camp in Nashville on the following 26 December; became unfit for service; and was discharged in Nashville on 20 August 1863.

Private K. Kittilson

Private Knud Kittilson of Leland, Illinois, enlisted under Captain Campbell on 25 February 1862 and was mustered in on 1 March in Madison. He was 34 years old and single.

He was sick on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862; was wounded and taken prisoner at Stones River on 31 December that year; was a prisoner of war on parole in the camp at Dennison, Ohio, and in St. Louis, Missouri; and was transferred to the Veteran Reserve Corps on 1 August 1863.

Private Ole Kittilson

Private Ole Kittilson of Chicago enlisted under Captain Campbell on 12 February 1862 and was mustered in on the 13th in Madison. He was 39 years old and single.

He was detached and with Company A on Island Number 10 in April 1862; was with the provision transport from Stevenson on 13 October 1863; was sick in Chattanooga on the following 28 November; was sick in the camp hospital on 2 July 1864; was mustered out with the company; and is entered on the Roll of Honor, 2nd Brigade, 1st Division, 20th Army Corps.

Private Syvert Larson

Private Syvert Larson of Neenah enlisted under Captain Campbell on 5 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 18 years old and single.

He went missing in the Battle of Stones River on 31 December 1862; was arrested and locked up the same day—he had probably tried to get away and avoid the bloody work; was an escort with the provision transport on 13 October 1863; and was mustered out with the company.

Corporal Halvor A. Lee

Corporal Halvor A. Lee of Mt. Horeb enlisted under Captain Campbell on 14 January 1862 and was mustered in on the 27th in Madison. He was 20 years old and single.

He was named corporal on 1 December 1862, became unfit for service, and was discharged in Murfreesboro on 2 March 1863.

Private Ole A. Lee

Private Ole A. Lee of Mt. Horeb enlisted under Captain Campbell on 10 February 1862 and was mustered in on the next day in Madison. He was 17 years old and single.

He was killed in the Battle of Murfreesboro (Stones River) on 31 December 1862.

Private A. Mickelson

Private Andrew Mickelson of Lewiston enlisted under Captain Campbell on 25 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 25 years old and single.

He was named wagon master on 12 February 1862; was left behind with the baggage train in Nashville on 26 December that year; was with the brigade on military police duty on 16 and 20 June 1863; was sick in Chattanooga on the following 28 November; and was mustered out with the company.

Private A. Monson

Private Anton Monson of Manitowoc enlisted under Sergeant N. Johnson on 4 December 1863 and was mustered in on the same day in Madison. He was 32 years old.

He joined the company at Strawberry Plains on 31 March 1864; was taken prisoner at New Hope Church on 27 May that year; was back with the company on the following 4 August; was transferred to Company H; and from there was transferred to the 24th Infantry, and finally to Company I in the 13th on 10 June 1865.

Sergeant Julius C. Monson

Sergeant Julius C. Monson of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 25 October 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 19 years old and single.

He was named sergeant on 1 January 1862; was sick in the hospital in Louisville on 1 October that year, became unfit for service, and was discharged on the following 29 October.

Private Halvor Musens

Private Halvor Musens of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 8 January 1862 and was mustered in on the 11th in Madison. He was 19 years old and single.

He was an orderly in the hospital in Murfreesboro on 20 October 1863; was sick in the hospital in Nashville on the following 18 November; had been sick in either Louisville, Kentucky, or Jeffersonville, Indiana, in October; was sick in Nashville on 15 June 1864; and was mustered out with the company.

Private Jacob Nelson

Private Jacob Nelson of Bad Ax enlisted under Captain Torkildson on 16 October 1861 and was mustered in on 15 November in Madison. He was 40 years old and married.

He became unfit for service and was discharged in Murfreesboro on 14 February 1863.

Private Nels Nelson

Private Nels Nelson of Spring Prairie enlisted under Captain Campbell on 23 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison.

He was killed at Stones River on 31 December 1862 and is buried there in the national cemetery, section ^K~~H~~, grave number ⁴⁶⁸⁰~~98~~. He was transported there from the battlefield.

Private Halvor Olson

Private Halvor Olson of Mt. Horeb enlisted under Captain Campbell on 14 January 1862 and was mustered in on the 27th in Madison. He was 21 years old and single.

He was sick in the hospital (on Island Number 10?) on 6 April 1862; suffered minor wounds and went missing during the Battle of Stones River on 31 December that year; was sent to Nashville, then to the camp at Dennison, Ohio; was an escort with the provision transport from Stevenson on 13 October 1863; was transferred to the 68th Indiana on 1 February 1864; was transferred back on the following 2 April; was wounded in the right leg at New Hope Church on the following 27 May; and was discharged from Harvey Hospital in Madison, Wisconsin, on the following 14 October because of his wounds.

Private Knud Olson

Private Knud Olson of Chicago enlisted under Captain Gasman on 1 October 1861 and was mustered in on 15 November in Madison. He was 26 years old and single.

He was with the Pioneer Corps on 26 November 1862. He died of chronic diarrhea in Hospital Number 4 in Murfreesboro on 21 November 1863.

Private Nils Olson

Private Nils Olson of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 25 October 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 42 years old and married.

He was sick on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862; was absent with the commissary supply train; was sick in Iuka on the following 20 August; died of disease in the hospital in Jackson, Tennessee, on 22 September that year; and is buried in Corinth, Mississippi.

Private Nels S. Olson

Private Nels S. Olson of Pine Lake enlisted under Captain Campbell on 8 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 10th in Madison. He was 29 years old and married.

He had leave and was sick in Pine Lake from 24 March until 24 April 1862; was sick on Island Number 10 on the following 11 June; became unfit for service; and was discharged in July or August that year—the reports do not give an exact date, only the year.

Private Ole Olson

Private Ole Olson, No. 1, of Palmyra, Jefferson County, enlisted under Captain Campbell on 13 November 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 26 years old and single.

He was sick in Chattanooga on 28 November 1863. He was mustered out with the company.

Private Ole Olson

Private Ole Olson, No. 2, of Mt. Horeb enlisted under Captain Campbell on 15 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 18th in Madison. He was 25 years old and single.

He was left behind in the hospital in Iuka on 20 August 1862; died of disease in Jackson, Tennessee, on the following 28 September; and is buried in Corinth, Mississippi.

Private Thomas Olson

Private Thomas Olson of Moscow, Iowa County, enlisted under Captain Campbell on 11 February 1862 and was mustered in on the 13th in Madison. He was 23 years old and single.

He was with the Pioneer Corps on 26 November 1862—sick; reported for service with the company on 14 August 1864; and was mustered out with it.

Private Elias Pederson

Private Elias Pederson of Portage enlisted under Captain Campbell on 27 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 18 years old and single.

He was sick in the hospital in Mound City, Illinois, on 6 April 1862; had leave and was absent because of illness; and died of disease in Portage, Wisconsin, on the following 10 June. No official notice of this was received, but he was reported dead through a private letter and has since been officially entered on the Rolls.

Private Hans Pederson

Private Hans Pederson of New Lisbon enlisted under Captain Campbell on 28 October 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 30 years old and single.

He was sick on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862 and died in a mobile hospital in Columbus, Ohio, on 23 September that year.

Private Peder Pederson

Private Peder Pederson of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 30 October 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 46 years old and married.

He was left behind in Iuka because of illness on 20 August 1862; died in the general hospital in Nashville on the following 8 December; and is buried in the cemetery there, section A, grave number ⁴⁷¹² 875.

Private Simon Peterson

Private Simon Peterson of La Crosse enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 28 December 1861 and was mustered in on 11 January 1862 in Madison. He was 35 years old and single.

He was transferred to Company I on 5 November 1862; was transferred to the 68th Indiana on 1 February 1864 and was transferred back on the following 2 April; was wounded in the left leg at New Hope Church on 27 May that year and was sent to the hospital; was then

sent to the Jefferson Barracks in Missouri; was mustered out with the company; and is entered on the Roll of Honor for the 2nd Brigade, 1st Division, 20th Army Corps.

Private Torger Peterson

Private Torger Peterson of Scandinavia enlisted under Captain Gasman on 30 October 1861 and was mustered in on 20 December in Madison. He was 26 years old and single.

He was sick in Mound City, Illinois, on 6 April 1862; was absent without leave on 13 October that year and was absent without leave in Waupaca, Wisconsin, on the 30th of that month; was in Company I, but was transferred from there in accordance with Colonel Heg's orders on 21 April 1863; was sick in the Jefferson Barracks and was sent from there to the hospital in Nashville on 28 June that year; was sick in Murfreesboro on the following 2 July and in Manchester just before that; and was mustered out in Madison, Wisconsin, on 13 February 1865.

Private Enock Reiersen

Private Enock Reiersen of Chicago enlisted under Captain Torkildson on 3 December 1861 and was mustered in, in Madison. He was 33 years old and married.

He had leave from Camp Randall, and while he was gone he suffered a strain that made him unfit for service, and he was therefore discharged on 14 February 1862. He was transferred to Company A and stood on its rolls for a while before the mistake was discovered. The record that exists lists the incorrect year for the "discharge" since it says 1863, and it should be 1862.

Private Christian Schow

Private Christian Schow (Skou?) of Waupun enlisted under Captain Campbell on 1 January 1862 and was mustered in on the 11th in Madison. He was 18 years old and single.

He was left behind in Iuka on 20 August 1862 because of illness; ran away from there on 30 March 1863; is entered as a deserter; and is said to have been discharged, but no official notice of this can be found.

Sergeant Edwin C. Schow

Sergeant Edwin C. Schow (Skou?) of Waupun enlisted under Captain Campbell on 8 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 24 years old and single.

He was named sergeant on 1 January 1862; was sick in the hospital in Jacinto on 28 July that year; and was discharged because of illness on the following 6 October.

Private Lewis Solberg

Private Lewis Solberg of Chicago enlisted under Captain Torkildson on 30 September 1861 and was mustered in on 15 November in Madison. He was 46 years old and single.

He was detached and with Company A on Island Number 10 from 1 April until 1 May 1862; stayed behind with the baggage train in Nashville on 6 December that year; was clerk in the brigade commissary on 9 May 1863; was sick in Stevenson on the following 28 August; and was transferred to the Veteran Reserve Corps on the 27th of that month, effective from 15 February 1864.

Private Ole Sorenson

Private Ole Sorenson of Waupun enlisted under Captain Campbell on 23 October 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 44 years old and married.

He went missing in a skirmish near Lancaster, (Danville), Tennessee, on 15 August 1862 and died of disease in the general hospital in Danville on 24 October that year, according to the quartermaster's report for the following month of December.

Private Jens Strøm

Private Jens Strom (Strøm?) of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 8 January 1862 and was mustered in on the 18th in Madison. He was 54 years old and a widower.

He was left behind in the hospital in Iuka on 20 August 1862 because of illness and was discharged in Louisville, Kentucky, on the following 23 October.

Private Lars Tallackson

Private Lars Tallackson of Portage enlisted under Captain Campbell on 28 November 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 22 years old and single; had blue eyes and blond hair; stood 5' 4-1/2" tall; and was a farmer.

He was sent to the camp hospital from the battlefield on 19 September 1863 (that is, at Chickamauga); died of chronic diarrhea in Chattanooga on the following 3 December; and is buried in the cemetery there, section D, grave number 151. He is entered on the Roll of Honor for the 2nd Brigade, 1st Division, 20th Army Corps. *COULD NOT FIND THIS RECORD AT CHATTANOOGA*

Private Thomas Thompson

Private Thomas Thompson of Spring Prairie enlisted under Captain Campbell on 8 November 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 21 years old and single.

He was sick in Bowling Green on 4 November 1862; was wounded at Chickamauga on 19 September 1863 and was sent to the hospital in Nashville; was absent with leave; and was mustered out with the company.

Corporal Nels M. Tobiason

Corporal Nels M. Tobiason of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 11 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 19 years old and single.

He was named corporal on 1 May 1862; was sick in Winchester, Tennessee, on 1 July 1863; was taken prisoner in the Battle of Chattanooga on 13 December that year; and was sent to Richmond, where he died on 2 February 1864. He is buried in the cemetery there.

Private Svend Torgerson

Private Svend Torgerson of Oconomowoc enlisted under Captain Campbell on 11 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 19 years old and single.

He was with the commissary supply train for a time in 1862; went missing in the Battle of Stones River on 31 December that year, but was back on 11 January 1863; was an escort with the provision transport from Stevenson on the following 13 October and was sick in Chattanooga on 28 November after that; and was mustered out with the company. In 1893 he was living in Sheridan, Wisconsin.

Private John Warp

Private John Warp of New Lisbon enlisted under Captain Campbell on 28 October 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 28 years old and single.

He suffered minor wounds and was taken prisoner at Stones River on 31 December 1862; was sent back to St. Louis for exchange; was sick in Nashville on 28 June and 31 October 1863; was sick in Chattanooga on the following 29 November; had leave and was in Wisconsin in 1864; and has not been heard from since.

Private William Watts

Private William Watts of Peoria, Illinois, enlisted under Captain Campbell on 28 December 1861 and was mustered in on 13 February 1862 in Madison. He was 47 years old and married.

He was sick and had leave from 30 March until 1 May 1862, when he was in Peoria; was sent there from Bird's Point; was absent without leave in Galesburg, Illinois; remained absent without leave; and is entered as a deserter, but is said to have been discharged at that time.

This company was mustered out in Chattanooga, Tennessee, on 13 February 1865.

Company E

Term of service: 3 years

Captain John Ingmundson

Captain John Ingmundson of Neshonoc, La Crosse County, received his commission on 10 December 1861, with rank from the ninth, and was mustered in on the 20th in Madison. He was 29 years old and married.

He was killed in the Battle of Stones River on 30 December 1862.

John Anthon Ingmundson was born on the Gathue farm in Rygge parish, Smaalenene, Norway, on 28 October 1832. He came to America in 1853 and began as a farmer in Allamakee County, Iowa, but in 1858 he moved to Neshonoc, Wisconsin, where he was living when he accepted his captain's commission.

He was the first of the officers in the 15th to bite the dust. When the Regiment fought the fateful Battle of Stones River, Company E was sent ahead as an advance force. The terrain here was difficult to cross: there were boulders, crevices, and among them large stones and thick cedar underbrush, so it was almost impossible to push forward, and the Rebels had hidden themselves here. Ingmundson stood right up and looked around and gave orders—one or another of the Rebels saw this, and our captain had fallen and was dead in just a few minutes. This made a deep impression on the Regiment; at that time they were still green in the field. His body was brought to the hospital and then buried, but in spite of all efforts, all attempts to find the grave have failed. He is buried among all of those who sleep their final sleep at Stones River, under one of the signs marked "unknown."

His blood flowed for the people's freedom
and he died for that.
Unknown! Nameless! Your life and courage
will never be questioned by any man
for one or another pettiness,
which always accompanies your name.

Captain Henry Hauff

Captain Henry Hauff of Stoughton enlisted on 20 October and was mustered into Company G in Madison. He was 25 years old and single.

He was named 1st lieutenant in that company on 11 January 1862, effective from 14 December 1861; was acting adjutant on 3 May 1862 and was promoted to adjutant on the following 1 October; was discharged from Company G in order to accept a commission as regiment adjutant and captain in Company E on 21 January 1863, although another report lists the date of his mustering out of Company G as 24 May 1863; and was killed in the Battle of Chickamauga on 19 September that year.

Henry Nikolai Hauff was born in Sandefjord, Norway, on 10 October 1836. In 1850 his father moved to Kristiania where Henry was a clerk in a hardware store, and later a bookkeeper in the railroad's freight office.

In 1857 (his brother says 1856; in Lieutenant Colonel Wilson's biography it says 1858) he came over with his friend Georg Wilson, later lieutenant colonel, and Samuel Thodberg, one of the few Scandinavians who joined the Rebel army. After his arrival in Madison, Wisconsin, Hauff was a clerk for a time in Fox and Howard's Hardware Store, but he soon went on a trip with his two friends to Texas. Hauff and Wilson returned before the war broke out, but Thodberg stayed behind in the slave state. When Hauff came back he got a position as bookkeeper in the Blackman Brothers firm in Stoughton, where he was when he enlisted in the 15th.

He was a clever soldier and would have gone far if he had lived. But he was killed at Chickamauga and, since the enemy held the battlefield for almost two months, his body was never found but lies under the marker "unknown" in the national cemetery at Chattanooga.

Soldier! a singular name you won;
 the other beloved ones,
 who lie here in every corner,
 scarcely receive the greatest honor;
 everyone who passes by your grave,
 looks at "unknown" with sympathy.

1st Lieutenant Iver W. Tjentland

First Lieutenant Iver William Tjentland of Moscow, Iowa County, received his commission in Madison on 10 December 1861. He was 33 years old and married.

He resigned on 3 September 1862.

He was born in the Aardal annex of Hjelmeland parish, Ryfylke, Norway, on 12 July 1828; was a noncommissioned officer for a while in the Jedder company of the Stavanger Corps; was at the under officer's school in Kristiansand for two years; came to America after serving his compulsory military service; and became a farmer in Moscow, Iowa County, Wisconsin.

His health was not strong enough to take part in the war, but when the 15th was supposed to be recruited he went along to enlist people for it and was very successful. When Company E was organized the soldiers wanted to elect him as captain, but he turned down this honor because of his poor health and lack of knowledge of the English language. After scarcely a year he had to ask for a discharge because of illness. He then moved back to his farm. He is regarded as a well-bred and respected man.

Captain Torkild A. Rossing

Captain Torkild A. Rossing of Wiota, La Fayette County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 4 October 1861 and was mustered in, in Madison. He was 22 years old and single.

He was named sergeant on 11 December 1861, then sergeant major on 1 July 1862; was named 1st lieutenant on 8 January 1863 with rank from 3 September the year before; was then named captain on 7 April 1864; and served out his term. According to official reports from the

War Department dated 10 June 1892, T. A. Rossing was commissioned as 1st lieutenant and captain, Company E, 15th Wisconsin Infantry, with rank from 1 January 1863 and 7 April 1864.

He was born on the Rossing farm in Land parish, Norway, in 1840, and came to America with his parents in 1857. His father, Andreas Olson, started a farm, and Torkild worked for others. A couple of years before the war he went to school in Warren, Illinois. He had intended to go through the usual academic courses, but he enlisted and served with honor during the war. After the war was over he was a businessman in Argyle, Wisconsin, for a while, then moved to Lott's Creek, Iowa, where he was a farmer. In 1893 he was living in Bode, Iowa.

1st Lieutenant Rollin Olson

First Lieutenant Rollin Olson of Argyle enlisted under Captain Ingmundson and was mustered in on 8 December 1861 in Madison. He was 30 years old and married.

He was named corporal (probably in Madison); is reported as sergeant on 19 September 1863 (in the Battle of Chickamauga), where he was taken prisoner and sent to Richmond; was a prisoner of war on parole in Annapolis, Maryland, on 1 September 1864; was promoted to 1st lieutenant on 10 November 1864; and was discharged as such on the following 16 December.

1st Lieutenant Thor P. Sloan

First Lieutenant Thor P. Sloan of Buchanan, La Crosse County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 11 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 20th in Madison. He was 28 years old; had blue eyes, dark hair, and fair skin; stood 5' 8" tall; and was a farmer.

He was a clerk in the brigade's headquarters on 1 July 1863; was sent to the camp at Chattanooga on the following 28 September; was absent on recruiting duty on 21 November that year; was promoted to 1st lieutenant on 7 April 1864; was wounded in the head at Kennesaw Mountain on the following 21 June; and died of his wounds on the 28th of that month.

Here, as in many other cases, the reports or records that now exist are incomplete. They say nothing about him being named sergeant already when the company was organized, and

nothing about him being taken prisoner at Stones River and having to hand over his weapon.

He soon saw the opportunity to escape from the Rebels, and returned to his own lines.

He was a quiet, honest, and conscientious man.

2nd Lieutenant John N. Brown

Second Lieutenant John N. Brown (John Nordal Brun) of Christiana, Dane County, enlisted under —— and was mustered into Company K (in the 3rd Wisconsin²¹) in Madison.

He was 22 years old.

He was named sergeant in Company K (3rd Wisconsin); had 20 days leave starting 3 February 1862; was promoted to 2nd lieutenant in Company G on 8 November that year with rank from 1 October; was seriously wounded at Stones River on 31 December 1862; was transferred as 2nd lieutenant to Company E on 8 January 1863, effective from 20 December 1862; and resigned on 9 April 1863.

Johan Nordal Brun was a great grandson of the famous bishop of that name and was born in Kobbervik, Norway, in October 1840. His father's name was also Johan Nordal Brun; he was a merchant. Our Johan Nordal Brun came to America when he was nine years old, along with Pastor A. C. Preus, who was married to his sister. He lived with them until after his confirmation. Then he learned to be a typographer and worked for some years for *Emigranten* in Madison, where he was when the war started. He first joined the 3rd Wisconsin, and in that regiment he was promoted to sergeant. Then he joined the 15th and was named 2nd lieutenant. In the Battle of Stones River he was seriously wounded and also taken prisoner, but was taken back immediately by the cavalry. He was somewhat hard of hearing, and he got worse with the din of the war, so he had to request a discharge.

After that he worked for *Fædrelandet* in La Crosse. He died in August 1864 at the age of 24.

2nd Lieutenant Peter W. Chantland

Second Lieutenant Peter W. Chantland of Primrose enlisted under ——— on 1 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 22 years old and single.

He began his service as an orderly or 1st sergeant; was sick in the hospital in Bowling Green on 17 September 1862; was promoted to 2nd lieutenant on 21 April 1863; but was sickly and resigned on the following 11 November.

On the morning of the beginning of the Battle of Stones River on 30 December 1862, Captain Ingmundson was killed, and the next morning the lieutenant was wounded, so the command of the company fell on Chantland during that terrible battle and for a time afterwards. After the battle General Rosecrans issued an order to the various regiments' commanders to submit to headquarters a list of one sergeant, two corporals and four or five privates in each company (altogether not more than six from each company), who had shown the greatest courage and ability during the battle. These would be entered on the Roll of Honor. Sergeant Chantland stands on this Roll of Honor as the first from Company E, 15th Wisconsin.

After the Battle of Chickamauga (24 September 1863) he was detached from the company and appointed as brigade commissary for the 3rd Brigade, 1st Division, 20th Army Corps. Because of his poor health he was forced to resign sometime later, but at that time it was impossible to travel north because there was almost no transport from Chattanooga, so he remained with the Regiment until after the Battle of Missionary Ridge. Since Chantland was now out of the army, but still had to accompany it wherever it went, he participated in a victorious battle after his resignation was accepted. After his homecoming with his parents in

Primrose in Dane County, Wisconsin, he was close to death for a while because the terrible army diarrhea kept him prisoner for four months.

In September 1864 he moved to Fort Dodge, Iowa, and bought land, and on the 20th of that month he registered the first deed that was recorded by a Norwegian in Webster County, where there are now hundreds of Norwegians. After this he returned to Wisconsin and went to school at Albion Academy during the spring and fall, and held school during the winter until spring in 1867, when he went back to Fort Dodge and began to farm. In 1869 he started a hotel in the city of Fort Dodge while at the same time running and expanding his farm. In 1872 his wife died and he sold the hotel and started an farm machinery business. In 1875 the Republican politicians threw a bone to the Norwegians in the form of a candidate for sheriff in the county, but this was seen as a hopeless race to win because the candidate on the other side was strong and had won over the Republican in the previous election. Chantland was victorious both then and in 1877. In 1879 he refused the nomination, but in 1881 he had to run again to strengthen a sinking party, and likewise in 1883. In 1885, however, he refused the honor of the nomination again. Since then he has successfully run a general store. After having refused political positions several times, he was elected in 1892 as the town's Justice of the Peace.

He was married in 1869 to Miss Julia L. Skaalen of New Ark, Rock County, Wisconsin. He had a son with her, who by the way is a teacher at the State University in Iowa. She died in 1872. In 1875 he married again, this time to Austeen Hatlestad's daughter, Amea, also of Rock County, Wisconsin.

Chantland was also a charter member and first commander of Fort Donelson Post Number 236 G.A.R. [Grand Army of the Republic] and was elected as commander over this post for the second time in 1890; there was then a membership of 180.

He has been a Freemason for 24 years and has held various positions within the organization: for the last eight years he has been Secretary of the Royal Arch Chapter and recorder of the Commander of Knights Templars.

He was also a charter member of a Lodge of the A.O.U.W.[#] (a life insurance organization) and the first Master Workman in this organization, and for most of the time has represented it in the Grand Lodge.

Since the law for the Relief of Union Soldiers and Sailors went into effect in 1888, he has been the secretary and the first business manager on the board for Relief Commissioners in Webster County.

This biography of Lieutenant Chantland has several counterparts among the old veterans of the 15th, but unfortunately it has been impossible to get hold of all of them; this sketch ends now with the beginning:

P. W. Tjentland (the name was changed to Chantland in the following way: his father's name was written on the deed for his first property according to the pronunciation, and the family accepted the accidental changing of the name Tjentland to Chantland) was born on the Tjentland farm in the Aardal annex of Hjelmeland parish, Norway, on 11 October 1840. He came to America with his parents in 1853. They settled in Primrose and began by buying a piece of land and starting a farm, as most of the newcomers did at that time.

2nd Lieutenant John Peters

Second Lieutenant John Peters of Primrose enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 11 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 21 years old and single.

He was a sergeant during the war; was sick on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862; was sick in Chattanooga on 29 June 1864; was mustered out with the company; and was named 2nd lieutenant on 25 February 1867, with rank from 11 November 1863.

Noncommissioned Officers and Privates

Corporal Simon Amundson

Corporal Simon Amundson of Coon Prairie enlisted under Captain Johnson on 23 October 1861 and was mustered in on 1 December in Madison. He was 27 years old and single.

He was sick in Bowling Green on 4 November 1862 and went missing at Dug Gap on 20 September 1863. He was probably taken prisoner because he died in Libby Prison, although the date of death is unknown.

Private Andrew Anderson

Private Andrew Anderson of Neshonoc enlisted under Captain Cooper on 5 January 1864 and was mustered in on the same day in La Crosse. He was 22 years old.

He joined the company at Knoxville; was sick in Nashville on 8 July 1864, and also in Chattanooga; was transferred to Company H at Whiteside on the following 20 December; and was transferred to Company I in the 13th Infantry.

Private Iver Anderson

Private Iver Anderson of Preston, Jackson County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 7 November 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 32 years old and single; had blue eyes, red hair, and fair skin; stood 5' 7" tall; and was a farmer.

He was wounded at Stones River and was sent to the hospital in Nashville, then to the hospital in New Albany, Indiana; was sick in Chattanooga on 28 November 1863; and was killed in the Battle of New Hope Church on 27 May 1864.

Private L. Arneson

Private Lawrence Arneson of Humburg, Bad Ax County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 13 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 20th in Madison. He was 26 years old and single.

He was left behind on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862 because of illness; was wounded at Stones River on the following 31 December and was sent to Nashville, then to the convalescent camp there; was sick in the camp hospital in Chattanooga; was wounded again at New Hope Church; and died of his wounds in Atlanta on 22 June 1864. He was transported to the cemetery in Maryetta [sic], Georgia, section A, grave number 105.

Private Peter Anderson

Private Peter Anderson of Preston, Jackson County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 7 November 1861 and was mustered in on 20 December in Madison. He was 30 years old and single.

He was sick in Iuka on 21 August 1862; was sick in the hospital in Gallatin, Tennessee; and was later mentally ill in the asylum in Washington, D.C., where he died of disease on 11 September 1864.

Private Nicholay Bidstrup

Private Nicholay Bidstrup of La Crosse enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 3 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 10th in Madison. He was 39 years old and single.

He was sick in Nashville on 26 November 1862, likewise on the following 26 December; was sick in Stevenson on 28 August 1863; and was transferred to the Veteran Reserve Corps on the following 1 September.

Private Halvor O. Brenden

Private Halvor O. Brenden of York, Green County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 17 December 1861 and was mustered in on 1 January 1862 in Madison. He was 27 years old and single.

He was sick in Iuka on 2 August 1862; was an escort with the provision transport from Stevenson on 13 October 1863; was sick in Chattanooga on 28 November; was also sick in Stevenson; and was mustered out with the company.

Private Andrew J. Bronken

Private Andrew J. Bronken of La Crosse enlisted under Captain Cooper on 24 February 1864 and was mustered in on the same day. He was 31 years old.

He joined the company at Knoxville; was transferred to Company H at Whiteside on the following 20 December; was transferred from there to the 24th Infantry; and was finally transferred to Company I in the 13th on 10 June 1865.

Private William Burgeson

Private William Burgeson of York, Green County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 2 November 1861 and was mustered in on 20 December in Madison. He was 20 years old and single; had blue eyes, dark hair, and fair skin; stood 5' 10" tall; and was a farmer.

He suffered minor wounds at Stones River and was sent to the camp hospital in Chattanooga, and then to Nashville where he died of disease on 9 November 1863. He is buried in the cemetery there, section E, grave number 185 and is entered on the Roll of Honor for the 2nd Brigade, 1st Division, 20th Army Corps.

Sergeant Even Christopherson

Sergeant Even Christopherson of Ettrick, Trempeleau County, enlisted under Captain Cooper on 10 February 1864 and was mustered in on the same day. He was 39 years old.

He joined the company at Knoxville and was sick on 8 July 1864. He was transferred to Company H at Whiteside, then to the 24th Infantry, and from there to Company I in the 13th on 10 June 1865.

Private Ole Christopherson

Private Ole Christopherson of Barre, La Crosse County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 8 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 20th in Madison. He was 25 years old and single.

He was sick on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862; was sick in the general hospital on the following 28 July; died of disease in Cincinnati, Ohio, on the following 6 September; and is buried in the cemetery at Spring Grove near Cincinnati, Lot B, grave number 140.

Undercook David Crockett

Undercook David Crockett enlisted under Lieutenant Rossing on 10 October 1863 in Chattanooga. He was a 30-year-old Negro. He was mustered in at the Cumberland Army's headquarters on the following 19 November.

He was sick in Atlanta in September 1864, was transferred first to Company H at Whiteside, and was then transferred to the 24th Infantry on 13 February 1865.

Private Gulbrand Dahl

Private Gulbrand Dahl of Moscow, Iowa County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 21 December 1861 and was mustered in on 6 January 1862 in Madison. He was 20 years old and single.

He was sick and with the Pioneer Corps on 24 November and 24 December 1862; was mustered out with the company; and is entered on the Roll of Honor for the 2nd Brigade, 1st Division, 20th Army Corps.

Private Ole E. Dahl

Private Ole E. Dahl of Springdale, Dane County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 4 January 1862 and was mustered in on the 6th in Madison. He was 23 years old and single.

He died of nervous fever in the hospital on Island Number 10 on 30 April 1862 and is buried in the Mississippi River Cemetery near Memphis.

Private Lewis Erickson

Private Lewis Erickson of Portland, Monroe County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 12 November 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 21 years old and single.

He became unfit for service and was discharged on Island Number 10 on 19 June 1862.

Corporal Ole Erickson

Corporal Ole Erickson of Arendahl, Fillmore County, Minnesota, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 18 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 20th in Madison. He was 23 years old and single; had brown eyes, blond hair, and fair skin; stood 5' 9" tall; and was a wagon maker.

He was sick in Chattanooga in November 1863; was sick in Nashville, where he died of chronic diarrhea on 29 January 1864; and is entered on the Roll of Honor for the 2nd Brigade, 1st Division, 20th Army Corps.

Private Ole Erickson

Private Ole Erickson, No. 1, of La Crosse enlisted under Captain Cooper on 26 February 1864 and was mustered in on the same day. He had blue eyes, blond hair, and fair skin; stood 5' 9-1/2" tall; and was a farmer.

He joined the company at Knoxville and was killed at New Hope Church on 27 May 1864.

Private Ole Erickson

Private Ole Erickson, No. 2, of Onalaska enlisted under Captain Cooper on 29 February 1864 and was mustered in on the same day. He was 30 years old; had blue eyes, blond hair, and fair skin; and was a farmer.

He joined the company at Knoxville and was killed at New Hope Church on 27 May 1864.

Musician Peter Erickson

Musician Peter Erickson of Viroqua enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 16 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 20th in Madison. He was 22 years old; had brown eyes, dark hair, and fair skin; stood 5' 9" tall; and was a farmer.

He was taken prisoner at Dug Gap on 20 September 1863 and was sent to Richmond, where he died of unknown causes in December of that year. He is buried in the cemetery there.

Private Torbjorn Erickson

Private Torbjorn Erickson of Primrose enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 26 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 37 years old and married.

He went missing on the road between Libanon [sic] and Cave City, Kentucky, and died of disease in Edgefield Junction, Tennessee, on 15 November 1862. He was transported from there to the cemetery in Nashville.

Private Torger Erickson

Private Torger Erickson of Coon, Bad Ax County, enlisted under Captain O. C. Johnson on 23 October 1861 and was mustered in on 1 December in Madison. He was 46 years old and single.

He was absent without leave on 6 October 1861, but was on military police duty on the following 20 December; was an escort with the provision transport from Stevenson on 13 October

1863; was sick in Chattanooga on the following 28 November, likewise in Nashville, and then in Knoxville on 24 February 1864; was sent to the hospital because of illness on the following 3 May; and was mustered out with the company.

Private Helge Espelee

Private Helge Espelee of York, Green County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 25 November 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 28 years old and single.

He was left behind on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862 because of illness, became unfit for service, and was discharged in Cincinnati, Ohio, on the following 6 August.

Private Syver K. Foss

Private Syver K. Foss of St. Peters, Nicollet County, Minnesota, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 5 October 1861 and was mustered in on 11 December in Madison. He was 44 years old and single.

He was left behind on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862 because of illness; was sick in the hospital in Murfreesboro on 20 March 1863; became unfit for service; and was discharged in Nashville on the following 15 July.

Private George Godrich

Private George Godrich of Ruthford, Minnesota, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 16 February 1862 and was mustered in on the 25th in Madison. He was 20 years old and single.

He was with the provision transport from Stevenson on 13 October 1863; was sick in Chattanooga on the following 28 December; was sick in Knoxville on 24 February 1864; and was mustered out with the company.

Sergeant G. Gunderson

Sergeant Gunder Gunderson of Primrose enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 12 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 23 years old and single.

He suffered minor wounds and was taken prisoner at Stones River on 31 December 1862; was then sent to St. Louis as a prisoner of war on parole; was sick on 18 July 1864; and was mustered out with the company.

Private C. Gunhus

Private Christian Gunhus of New Glarus, Green County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 13 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 18 years old and single.

He was left behind on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862 because of illness, was given leave, and died at home on the following 4 August.

Corporal Edwin Hadley

Corporal Edwin Hadley of Perry, Dane County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 18 October 1861 and was mustered in on 11 January 1862 in Madison. He was 19 years old and single.

He was on military police duty on 20 December 1862; was an escort with the provision transport from Stevenson on 13 October 1863; was sick in Chattanooga on 28 November that year; was sick in Nashville in February 1864; and was killed, shot through the head, at New Hope Church on the following 27 May.

Private Lars T. Halling

Private Lars T. Halling of Broadhead, Rock County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 12 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 44 years old and married.

He was sick on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862, became unfit for service, and was discharged on the 23rd of that month.

Private John (J.) Hatland

Private John (J.) Hatland of Freeman, Crawford County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 4 November 1861 and was mustered in on 27 January 1862 in Madison. He was 31 years old and married.

He was sick in the hospital in Danneville [*sic*], Kentucky, on 18 August 1862; ran off from there; and was discharged in St. Louis on 20 January so that he could join the Navy.

Corporal Anders Hanson

Corporal Anders Hanson (Kvænrud) of Freeborn County, Minnesota, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 27 November 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 27 years old and single.

He was sick in Nashville on 26 November 1862, became unfit for service, and was discharged there on 9 March 1863. In 1893 he was living in Decorah, Iowa.

Private Austen Hansen

Private Austen Hansen of Neshonoc enlisted under Captain Cooper on 29 February 1864 and was mustered in on the same day. He was 29 years old.

He joined the company at Knoxville; was transferred to Company H at Whiteside on 20 December 1864; was then transferred to the 24th Infantry; and was transferred to the 13th on 10 June 1865.

Private Hans Hanson

Private Hans Hanson of Moscow, Iowa County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 25 November 1861 and was mustered in on 1 December in Madison. He was 29 years old and married.

He was sick in the camp hospital in Chattanooga on 7 October 1863; died of chronic diarrhea on the following 13 December; is buried in the national cemetery in Chattanooga, section D, grave number ¹²⁷⁵⁷852; and is entered on the Roll of Honor for the 2nd Brigade, 1st Division, 20th Army Corps.

Private Jens Hanson

Private Jens Hanson of Onalaska enlisted under Captain O. C. Johnson on 23 October 1861 and was mustered in on 1 December in Madison. He was 45 years old.

He was left behind on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862 because of illness, became unfit for service, and was discharged in Jacinto on the following 6 August.

Private Niri Hanson

Private Niri Hanson of York, Green County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 5 November 1861 and was mustered in on 1 January 1862 in Madison. He was 29 years old and single.

He was left behind on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862 because of illness; was with the Pioneer Corps in November and December that year; was detached and assigned to the waterworks in Chattanooga on 14 September 1864; and was mustered out with the company.

Wagon Master Nils Hanson

Wagon master Nils Hanson of Neshonoc enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 14 November 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 31 years old and single.

He was left behind in Florence, Alabama, on 26 August 1862 because of illness; was shot under the left eye and taken prisoner at Chickamauga on 19 September 1863, but was given parole and was sent to the hospital in Chattanooga; became unfit for service; and was discharged in Nashville on 30 April 1864.

Private Ole Halvorson

Private Ole Halvorson of La Crosse enlisted under Captain Torkildson on 11 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 20th in Madison. He was 30 years old and single.

He was sick in Bowling Green on 17 September 1862, where he died of disease on the 24th of that month. He is buried in the cemetery in Nashville.

Private John Hoff

Private John Hoff of Humburg, Bad Ax County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 26 November 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 49 years old and married.

He was sick in Nashville on 26 November 1862, likewise in Stevenson on 28 August 1863, and was transferred to the Veteran Reserve Corps on 15 February 1864.

Private Peter Homlebeck

Private Peter Homlebeck of New Glarus enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 14 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 17th in Madison. He was 45 years old and single.

He was sick in the hospital in Bowling Green on 17 September 1862, where he died of disease on the following 12 October. He is buried in the cemetery in Nashville, section N,

grave number ~~160~~ ¹⁰³⁶⁹

Private John N. Hoverud

Private John N. Hoverud of Perry, Dane County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 23 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 23 years old and single.

He was an escort with the provision transport from Stevenson on 13 October 1863; was sick in Chattanooga on the following 28 November; likewise in Nashville; and was mustered out with the company.

Private Ole K. Hoverud

Private Ole K. Hoverud of (Perry?), Dane County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 24 December 1861 and was mustered in on 1 January 1862 in Madison. He was 19 years old and single.

He was left behind on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862 because of illness, became unfit for service, and was discharged in Cairo, Illinois, on the following 16 October.

Private Lars Ingebretson

Private Lars Ingebretson of Humburg, Bad Ax County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 1 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 8th in Madison. He was 35 years old and single.

He was sick in the convalescent camp at Murfreesboro in May 1863; likewise in Chattanooga, where he died of disease on the following 21 December; and is buried in the national cemetery there, section D, grave number ~~324~~¹²²²⁹.

Private Halvor Jensen

Private Halvor Jensen of York, Green County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 21 October 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 42 years old and single.

He was sick in the hospital in Nashville on 26 November 1862 and died there on 12 January 1863. *BURIED IN NASHVILLE CEMETERY SECTION A, GRAVE 4688*

Corporal Andrew Johnson

Corporal Andrew Johnson of Primrose enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 6 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 24 years old and single.

He was seriously wounded at Stones River on 30 December 1862 and was sent to the hospital in Nashville, then to the hospital in New Albany, Indiana, where he died of his wounds on 18 March 1863. He is buried in the cemetery there.

Private G. Johnson

Private Gulbrand Johnson of York, Green County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 27 October 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 24 years old and single.

He was left behind on Island Number 10 on 11 June 1862 because of illness and died of disease on Cairo, Illinois, on 3 October that year.

Private John Johnson

Private John Johnson of Onalaska enlisted under Captain O. C. Johnson on 23 October 1861 and was mustered in on 1 December in Madison. He was 22 years old and single.

He was sick in the hospital in Mound City, Illinois, on 18 March 1862; was absent without leave; was left behind for a few days at Bird's Point because of illness before he came to Mound City; was sick in Murfreesboro on 24 June 1863; died of consumption in New Albany, Indiana, on the following 14 July; and is buried in the cemetery there.

Private John M. Johnson

Private John M. Johnson of Primrose enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 1 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 18 years old and single.

He was with the provision transport from Stevenson on 13 October 1863, and was with the ambulance corps on 5 May 1864. He was mustered out with the company.

Private Knud Johnson

Private Knud Johnson of Viroqua enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 16 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 20th in Madison. He was 22 years old and single.

He was an orderly at brigade headquarters on 21 August 1863; was sick in the camp hospital in Chattanooga on the following 28 September; had been sick in Nashville in the spring of that year; was sick at Dalton on 22 February 1864; and was mustered out with the company.

Private Lewis C. Johnson

Private Lewis C. Johnson of Viroqua enlisted under Captain B. F. Cooper on 22 February 1864 and was mustered in on the same day. He was 28 years old.

He joined the company at Knoxville; was sick in the hospital on 3 May 1864; was transferred to Company H at Whiteside; had a 30-day leave starting on 29 January 1865; was transferred to the 24th Infantry; and was transferred from there to Company I in the 13th on 10 June 1865.

Private Peter Johnson

Private Peter Johnson, No. 1, of Primrose enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 20 December 1861 and was mustered in on the same day in Madison. He was 26 years old and married.

He was an orderly in the hospital in Bowling Green on 16 September 1862 and for a while in 1863; was sick in Chattanooga on 28 November 1863, likewise in Nashville; was wounded in the right side at New Hope Church on 27 May 1864 and was sent to the hospital in

the Jefferson Barracks in St. Louis; and was mustered out in Madison, Wisconsin, on 20 December that year.

Private Peter Johnson

Private Peter Johnson, No. 2, of Coon, Bad Ax County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 5 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 10th in Madison. He was 30 years old and single.

He was sick in Bowling Green on 24 November 1862, died there on 11 January 1863, and was transported to the national cemetery in Nashville, section N, grave number ~~310~~¹⁰⁵¹⁹.

Private John Jørgenson

Private John Jørgenson of Perry, Dane County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 18 January 1862 and was mustered in on the 27th in Madison. He was 26 years old and single.

He was sick in the hospital in Nashville on 26 November 1862, likewise on the following 26 December; was sick in Stevenson on 9 and 15 September 1863; was sick in Knoxville on 24 February 1864; suffered a minor wound in the hand at Kennesaw on 21 June that year and was sent to the hospital; and was mustered out with the company.

Private Simon Jørgenson

Private Simon Jørgenson of Ettrick enlisted under Captain Cooper on 10 January 1864 and was mustered in on the same day. He was 35 years old.

He joined the company at Knoxville; was seriously wounded in the right knee at Resaca on 14 May 1864 and was sent to the hospital; was transferred to Company H at Whiteside; was reported sick in three different places quite distant from each other on 13 February 1865; and was transferred to the 24th and then to the 13th Infantry. However, he was mustered out in Madison, Wisconsin, on 8 August 1865 as a member of Company E, 15th Wisconsin.

Corporal Ewin Julson

Corporal Ewin Julson of Perry, Dane County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 8 November 1864 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 21 years old and single.

He was sick in Chattanooga on 28 November 1863 and died there of chronic diarrhea on 2 January 1864. He is buried in the national cemetery there, section D, grave number ~~669~~ ¹²⁵⁷⁴.

Private James Julson

Private James Julson of Perry, Dane County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 8 November 1861 and was mustered in on 6 January 1862 in Madison. He was 23 years old and single.

He was sick in the hospital in Bowling Green on 16 and 17 September 1862; was sick in Nashville on 8 August and 11 November 1863 and in Evansville, Indiana, on 15 September that year; was sick in the hospital in Chattanooga on the following 11 October; and was mustered out with the company.

Private A. Kjelsvig

Private Anon Kjelsvig of York, Green County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 29 November 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 22 years old and single.

He was left behind in the hospital in Iuka on 20 August 1862 because of illness; suffered minor wounds and was taken prisoner at Stones River on the following 21 December; was a prisoner of war on parole in St. Louis; was in service again on 9 June 1863; was wounded in the ankle at Chickamauga on 19 September that year; and was sent to Chattanooga, where he was on the following 20 November; and was in Nashville on the following 11 December. He was accidentally wounded in the right hand at Atlanta and was mustered out with the company.

Private Ole Kjöstolson

Private Ole Kjöstolsen of Coon, Bad Ax County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 22 November 1861 and was mustered in on 10 December in Madison. He was 35 years old and single.

He was temporarily transferred to the 8th Wisconsin Battery on 29 July 1863 and re-enlisted there under Captain Stiles on 5 January 1864.

Private Henry Knudson

Private Henry Knudson of Moscow, Iowa County, enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 2 December 1861 and was mustered in on 8 December in Madison. He was 19 years old and single.

He applied for a discharge in Nashville on 24 November 1862 in order to join the 4th U.S. Cavalry.

Here is a simple opportunity to give a short biographical sketch of one of the few in the 15th who left the Regiment and joined a different branch of the army.

Henry Knudson was born on the Klevegaard farm in Nordre Aurdal, Valdres, Norway, on 26 September 1843. He came to America with his parents in 1853 and enlisted, as stated above, in Moscow, Wisconsin. He was present for all the Regiment's skirmishes until 24 November 1862. Then he joined the 4th U.S. Cavalry. After having passed the exam he was transferred to Company K in the 4th Cavalry. He served as bodyguard for General Rosecrans and was an orderly for General Otis; was present at Stones River, where the 4th U.S. Cavalry saved the ammunition train for the Army, along with many other battles and skirmishes; and was shot through the right lung on 19 February 1863, some 29 miles from Murfreesboro, between Auburn and Liberty. The bullet entered between the fifth and sixth ribs and exited through the backbone. This occurred as close as five or six rods to the enemy. He became unfit for service and was discharged on 18 July 1863.

He then traveled to Goodhue County, Minnesota. There he farmed for part of the time, ran a wheat business, and was also a store clerk in Red Wing. He moved to Jackson County in

Minnesota in 1870; became Deputy Sheriff in 1871; became Sheriff the following year and held this office for two years; was then elected as County Treasurer and was re-elected, so he held this office until 1878; was a Judge of Probate for three and one-half years; also ran a land, loan, and insurance business alongside farming until 1887; was then again re-elected as Judge of Probate and was re-elected again; served out his term as such in 1891; and because of ill health could not accept the office again. He has also been Chairman of the Board of Supervisors and Justice of the Peace as well as Postmaster in Jackson County and Lakefield, and a town alderman[#], a town judge, and the town clerk^{##} in Heron Lake. In the fall of 1893 he was out on the West Coast because of his health. Practical! And all this in spite of a Rebel bullet through the chest.

Musician Thore Knudsen

Private Thore Knudsen of Barre enlisted under Captain Ingmundson on 7 December 1861 and was mustered in on the 20th in Madison. He was 24 years old and single.

He was sick in the hospital on 3 August 1864 and was mustered out with the company.

Private Ole Larsen

Private Ole Larsen of Neshonoc enlisted under Captain Cooper on 29 February 1864 and was mustered in on the same day. He was 25 years old.

He joined the company at Knoxville and was sick in Chattanooga on 30 October 1864. He was transferred to Company H at Whiteside, and from there to the 24th Infantry, but was dead in Nashville on 10 December 1864. He is buried in the cemetery there in section E, grave number 2,635. *OR 1265*
