Time was spent in recruiting and preparing for a successful move on Bragg who was at this time at Murfreesboro, and by the way was somewhat troublesome. Christmas was a very dry.

One thing caused it to seem so dull the 31st. And had to go on Picket the morning of 26th orders came to us to prepare to move immediately. The army was in motion in short order we moved towards Murfreesboro and arrived before 3 o'clock P.M. we came up on the enemy's advance at Laverge. After a sharp skirmish the

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Rebs were driven from the place and we took up camp for the night. The morning of the 27th was so cloudy and dark that it was a late hour before the army was in motion. Gen. Crittenden moved to Stewards Creek the 27th and camped. 28th being Sunday there was no move. 29th found us on the move in line of battle. We had to ward Stewards Creek on the 29th.

Rebs were driven from the place and we took up camp for the night. The morning of the 27th was so cloudy and dark that it was a late hour before the army was in motion. Gen. Crittenden moved to Stewards Creek the 27th and camped. 28th being Sunday there was no move. The 29th found us on the move in line of battle. We headed toward Stewards Creek on the 29th.

Commenced along the
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Gen McCook becoming
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Pike. Gen Crittendens
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Gen. Crittendens command
constituted the left wing.
The 22nd Brigade fought her

Old fashioned stubborn way lying down the Rebs made three separate and distinct charges upon our line and not a man flinched and as often they fell back in disorder leaving many dead and the wounded upon the ground. For four hours we held our ground, after which we became surrounded or nearly so. It became necessary

for the Gen. commanding to order us out which was done and out we went on this retreat. Co. G lost one man. Killed: namely Corp. Jacob Meadows, shot through the body. The Brigade fell back, crossed the R.R., formed ready for action again, and drove the enemy in turn to their original position.

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 Jan 2nd was expected

 o'clock it was discovered

was ours. Rebs fled
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and wounded lay thicker

Our Division ordered

Remained in camp
at Murfreesboro until
Jan 19th 7 miles

Creek fixed up winter
quarters took several

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Gen. John M. Palmer who was commanding our division ordered a charge made by 31st Ind. Vols. in front of our lines. The General led the charge. Co. G stood picket that night. The 3rd was spent in burying the dead. The 4th our forces occupied Murfreesboro, the Rebs making a hasty retreat towards Tullahoma.

Remained in camp at Murfreesboro until Jan. 19th 7 miles east and went into camp to Cripple Creek. Fixed up winter quarters. Took several scouts, one to Woodberry that was very successful. Remained here till the 24th of June. Passed off the time in drilling and picket duty. June 24th found the Army of the Cumberland

again making forward movement to Bragg's army at this time was in the vicinity of Tullahoma.

Moved in the direction of Manchester, passing through Bradyville 26th arrived at Manchester 29th without any resistance. Moved on the 30th 10 miles south of Manchester and camped several days returning to Manchester July 8th 63

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and camped. Nothing of naught occurred while here. Remained at Manchester till Aug. 16th when we again took up the line of march for C---. Reached mountain 15 miles south east of Mc Minville Aug. 18th commenced crossing the 18th and by the 19th all was over. The 31st Ind. was detailed to help with the train

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Reached Dunlap the 20th.
 Left Dunlap for Chat-
 tanooga Sept 1st '63. Passed through
 Jasper's 3rd - crossed
 the Tenn River at
 Shellmound the
 Night of the 3rd.
 On the Evening of
 the 5th we were again
 moving arriving at
 Chattanooga Sept 9th
 the Rebs having
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 & 8th, following
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the 10th Passed
 through Ringould
 the 11th found Rebs
 in force at Lee and
 Goddens mill on
 Sunday 13th there
 was some Skirmishing
 near Lee & Goddens mill
 from the 13th to 18th
 found us - the 21st
 Army Corps trying
 to form a junction
 with the main force
 which was some
 miles south of us
 on the 17th & 18th
 Gen Rosecrans HDQ

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was at Crawfish Springs, on the evening 18th we returned to Lee and Gosdens mill. A line of Battle early next morning the Enemy Occupying the east bank of the Chicamauga while the Federals had the west side a few shots were fired. Early in the morning but few expecting a general engagement at this time

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and Place. It became known to the Gen. Comd^g that Gen Bragg was aiming to cut his retreat to Chattanooga. Sharp Skirmishing all the forenoon of the 19th the Battle did not become general till 2 o'clock P.M. at which time the 31st Ind. taking her accustomed position in the front fought bravely, having 7 killed & 70 wounded

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On the spot this position was held till the evening disappeared. Only to make his appearance in our flank and in stronger force by this move we were compelled to fall back and take up a new line still farther to the left. This was our position for the remainder of the battle. Sunday morning came in its usual splendor

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The rose clear and bright not a cloud to be seen in the battle was renewed early on the 20th as if it was by mutual agreement in order to make a good day's work of it. Bragg trying to flank Rosecrans on the left but was disappointed the tide of battle on the 20th against the Federals. Ground lost and everything looked gloomy

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Artillery was lost
men were ~~panic~~

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On Missionary Ridge
 keeping that position
 until night with
 some skirmishing at
 night we fell back
 to Chattanooga and
 taking position on
 same ground where
 now stands the most
 formidable work
 in the U. S. Line
 This is a ~~strongly~~

 position in the confeder-
 acy. Bragg moved

on Missionary Ridge, keep-
 ing that position until
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 ing. At night we fell back
 to Chattanooga and tak-
 ing position on same
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 This is considered the

 all in plain view
 of the federal camp.
 Oct 3rd Rebs. opened
 fire on our works
 from M. - Ridge and
 Lookout Mountain
 Shelled all day

 in fortifying day &
 night. On the 20th

 ary Ridge and Chatta-
 nooga Valley and Look-

 McCook and Crittenden,
 were relieved
 of their commands
 Gen. Grant taking
 command of all
 the forces both
 departments. On the
 evening of the 24th
 orders came to be ready
 to move immediately
 for Shellmound. At
 3 o'clock A.M. of
 the 25th the 1st Division
 was in motion and
 succeeded in crossing

the Tenn River and
 getting entirely out of
 sight before daylight.
 Hooker commenced
 fighting the Rebs the
 28th. Arrived at
 Shellmound 29th. Crossed
 on Pontons same
 night. Left Shellmound
 for Bridgeport Ala.
 Nov. 3rd arrived same
 day. Distance 8 miles.
 Since that time we
 have been playing the
 Soldier on a grand
 scale Christmas
 Came for 3rd time
