# MISSISSIPPI RIFLES,

## A VOLUNTEER INFANTRY COMPANY.

Organized at Jackson, Miss., 1858.

### NAME AND ORGANIZATION.

The MISSISSIPPI RIFLES, a military company of the city of Jackson, was organized in the year 1858, as a volunteer infantry company, formed in accordance with the militia laws of the State of Mississippi, and commanded by the following named officers:

### COMPANY OFFICERS.

### STRENGTH AND DISCIPLINE.

This company was composed of the young men of the city, numbering over one hundred, rank and file, and were well-drilled and disciplined under those veteran old soldiers—JULIENNE, GRIFFITH and BROWN, who had served with gallantry in the Mexican war—presenting a beautiful and soldier-like appearance at drills and on parades, and were looked on with pride and admiration by the citizens of Jackson, and received a premium at the State Fair, for its excellence in drill, and fine military movements generally.

### UNIFORM.

The dress uniform of the company was made of very fine dark blue cloth. Frock coats, single-breasted, with one row of buttons down front; red epaulettes; collar and sleeves trimmed with red tape. Pants, with red stripe, one inch in width, down leg. Black felt hats, high crown, right side looped up with a brass eagle—a bugle and letters, "M. R." in front.

### COMPANY ARMS.

The Governor of the State, JOHN J. PERRUS, armed the company with the celebrated brass-mounted Mississippi

Rifles and heavy Sabre Bayonets, from the State Armory, with which the famous FIRST MISSISSIPPI REGIMENT, under the command of that gallant soldier, noble patriot and distinguished statesman, Colonel JEFFERSON DAVIS, were armed, and had been used by Mississippi soldiers in the battles of Buena Vista, Monterey, and on other battle-fields, in the war with Mexico, 1846-'47.

### CHANGE OF COMMANDERS.

During the year 1860, Captain JULIENNE resigned. Lieutenant GRIFFITH was then elected to command the company. In 1861, at the commencement of the war between the North and South, Captain GRIFFITH was appointed Adjutant General of the State, and ROBERT A. SMITH, then a Lieutenant, was chosen commander of the MISSISSIPPI RIFLES, and after being mustered into the Confederate States service, March 26, 1861, led the company to Pensacola, Florida.

### AN ESCORT--READY FOR SERVICE.

In the month of February, 1861, this company volunteered as an escort, and guard of honor, to accompany Hon. JEFFERSON DAVIS, on his way to Montgomery, Alabama, the Capital of the Southern Confederacy, having been chosen President of the Confederate States. After escorting the President as far as Grand Junction, Tennessee, the company returned to Jackson, to wait for and watch the coming of the hour when they could show their patriotism by enlisting in the Confederate States service—to become defenders of their homes, and in view of taking the field to illustrate their devotion to the cause of the South.

**SECESSION--WAR DECLARED**

The State of Mississippi, together with other Southern States, having seceded from the Union, and war between the North and South being proclaimed; on the first day of March, 1861, the first requisition was made on the State, from the Confederate States Government, for fifteen hundred infantry, to serve for twelve months at Pensacola, Florida.

**CALL FOR SOLDIERS.**

The Governor of the State issued a proclamation calling on volunteer companies to fill the requisition. The companies then organized throughout the State, nobly responded to the first call made on Mississippi for soldiers—sons of the South to take the field in defence of their homes and country—and promptly enlisted for service under the Confederate Flag, resigning every position, and pressing forward for the tented field, and were placed on a war footing.

**TENDERING SERVICES.**

The MISSISSIPPI RIFLES, a volunteer infantry company of the city of Jackson, commanded by Captain ROBERT A. SMITH, held a war meeting, on the 20th day of March 1861, when a large majority of the company tendered their services to the Confederate States Government, and on the 25th, were mustered for twelve months service by Adjutant General RICHARD GRIFFITH.

**BATTLE FLAG.**

The company was then presented with a beautiful silk banner by the Ladies of Jackson, with the inscriptions—"MISSISSIPPI RIFLES," "OUR BOYS," imprinted thereon—which was

delivered to the company, with an appropriate address, by a young lady of Jackson. The RIFLES then declared themselves ready of marching orders under their Southern battle-flag.

**READY FOR THE MARCH.**

On the 23d day of March, the YAZOO RIFLES, Captain S. M. PHILLIPS, from Yazoo City, and the MADISON RIFLES, Captain JOS. R. DAVIS, from Canton, arrived at Jackson. On the 25th, an order was issued to proceed to Pensacola—when the MISSISSIPPI, MADISON and YAZOO RIFLES proudly paraded the streets, with strong arms and brave hearts, as soldiers ready to do the bidding of their State.

**OFF TO THE WAR.**

On the morning of the 26th day of March, 1861, the MISSISSIPPI RIFLES bidding farewell to their relatives, homes and friends, took the cars at Jackson, and on arriving at Mobile, on the 28th, were ordered into camps at the Fair Grounds, where other companies from Mississippi were quartered, remaining ten days, then ordered to rendezvous at Pensacola, by General BRAXTON BRAGG, commanding Pensacola Troops.

**ARRIVAL AT PENSACOLA.**

On the 8th day of April, the Mississippi Troops left Mobile, proceeded up the Alabama river fifty miles. On the 10th, the battalion left camp near the river, to commence their first march, a distance of fifty miles to the railroad leading to Pensacola. After two days tramp, in light marching order, the troops arrived at Pensacola, on the 12th, were transported by steamer across Pensacola Bay, to the

United States Navy Yard, at Warrenton, nine miles from Pensacola, and ordered into camps near Fort Barrancas, between the Navy Yard and Fort McRae, United States Troops having possession of Fort Pickens, across Pensacola Bay, commanding entrance to the harbor and city from the Gulf.

**ORGANIZATION OF REGIMENTS.**

Twenty companies of infantry from Mississippi having arrived, two regiments were organized, designated as the NINTH and TENTH MISSISSIPPI REGIMENTS. The MISSISSIPPI RIFLES were assigned to the Tenth Regiment, as Company A. In the month of June, the MISSISSIPPI RIFLES, with four other companies were detached from the Regiment, and placed in Fort McRae, acting as a garrison, building sand batteries, working on fortifications, and fighting sand flies and fleas.

**PROMOTIONS.**

On the promotion of Captain ROBT. A. SMITH to the command of the TENTH REGIMENT, Lieutenant JAMES BARR was chosen company commander.

**SERVICE--RE-INLISTMENT--DISCHARGE.**

After four months service at Fort McRae, participating in the Bombardment between Fort Pickens the Federal Gulf Fleet and Navy Yard, Forts Barrancas and McRae, the five companies were relieved, and returned to Regiment, where they remained until time of service was about to expire; when a majority of the MISSISSIPPI RIFLES re-inlisted for three years of the war, in GEORGE DOBSON's new company, formed at Pensacola, January 18, 1862. The re-inlisted men received furloughs for thirty day, with orders to re-organize at Corinth, for active field service. The remainder of the company failing to re-inlist, was sent to Corinth with the Regiment, where they were discharged, April 1862.

FORMATION OF NEW COMPANY.

At the commencement of the second year of the war, in response to a call from General BRAGG, commanding the Army of Pensacola, (the time of the twelve months troops about expiring) to re-inlist for three years or the war, the MISSISSIPPI RIFLES, to the number of fifty-one, formed a new company, retaining the original name, and after electing GEORGE DOBSON commander, were mustered in for the war, at Pensacola, Florida, January 18th, 1862, and received furloughs for thirty days, leaving for home on the 19th, to report at Corinth for duty in thirty days time.

JOIN THE ARMY OF MISSISSIPPI.

Having received fifty recruits at Jackson, the company, one hundred men, reported for duty at Mobile, Ala., on the 24th day of February, and were ordered to Corinth, to join the Army of Mississippi, then being formed under General A. S. JOHNSTON. At Montgomery, the company remained in camps fifteen days, elected company officers—then proceeded to Iuka, Mississippi, to rejoin the regiment which had arrived from Pensacola.

RE-ORGANIZATION OF REGIMENTS.

On the 10th day of May, 1862, the company, together with the Ninth and Tenth Regiments left Iuka, and on arriving at Corinth, were ordered into camps, for re-organization. The MISSISSIPPI RIFLES were placed in the TENTH REGIMENT, as Company D., at the formation of the new Regiment. The remainder of the old companies were then discharged, and returned to their homes, joining other commands.

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## MISSISSIPPI RIFLES.

## ACTIVE FIELD SERVICE.

The MISSISSIPPI RIFLES, with its brave and fearless chieftain, Captain GEORGE DOBSON as its leader to victory in the holy cause of the South, contributed its full share to the brilliant and glorious reputation the TENTH MISSISSIPPI INFANTRY REGIMENT won for itself in the various campaigns of the ARMY OF TENNESSEE, commanded successively by Generals A. S. JOHNSTON, BEAUREGARD, BRAGG, J. E. JOHNSTON, and HOOD, following the fortunes of that Army throughout the long struggle for independence, conducting themselves with gallantry on every battle-field, from Shiloh to Nashville. They gloriously followed the "SOUTHERN CROSS," the battle-flag of the TENTH REGIMENT, and shared the honor and glory of imprinting on its proud folds, the names of victories gained in hard-fought battles. At the commencement of the war they attached themselves to the cause of the SOUTHERN CONFEDERACY, and faithfully and steadily followed the "CONQUERED BANNER," of the "LOST CAUSE," till the end of the mighty struggle.

## MARCHES.

This company has marched through the States of Mississippi, Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Tennessee, Kentucky, North Carolina and South Carolina, a distance of three thousand one hundred and fifty miles on foot, and has traveled the distance of five thousand eight hundred and eighty miles over the different railroads and rivers in the Southern States; and furnished three Regimental officers, four Staff officers and four Color-Bearers to the Regiment.
