## BUSHARTS AND KENTUCKY 1861-1865

THE INTRODUCTORY TO THIS REPORT IS THE CIVIL WAR, BUSHARTS WITHIN THE 3<sup>RD</sup> MOUNTED INFANTRY REGIMENT OF KENTUCKY ( KENTUCKY BRIGADE ), 5<sup>TH</sup> TENNESSEE INFANTRY REGIMENT, 10<sup>TH</sup> TENNESSEE CAVALRY AND THE 20<sup>TH</sup> ( RUSSELLS ) TENNESSEE CAVALRY REGIMENT WITH REFERENCE TO ATTACHED REPORTS ONE AND TWO. VERIFICATION FOR AUTHENTICITY IS THE COMPENDIUM OF THE U.S. CIVIL WAR AND PUBLISHED RECORDS OF THE 3<sup>RD</sup>, 7<sup>TH</sup>, 8<sup>TH</sup> AND 12<sup>TH</sup> KENTUCKY C.S.A. WRITTEN BY HENRY GEORGE. MAY 11, 1911.

THERE ARE PEOPLE OF KENTUCKY AND OF THE UNITED STATES THAT ARE UNAWARE OF A COMMAND CALLED THE " KENTUCKY BRIGADE " ALTHOUGH THE RECORDS SHOW THEY PERFORMED A HARD SERVICE AND ENGAGED IN THE MOST FIERCELY FOUGHT BATTLES OF THE CIVIL WAR : SHILOH, BATON ROUGE, CORINTH, BAKERS CREEK, BRICES CROSSROADS, HARRISBURG, FRANKLIN, NASHVILLE AND ALL OF FORRESTS ENGAGEMENTS FOR THE LAST YEAR AND A HALF OF THE WAR.

BACKGROUND IS THAT THEY BEGAN ON SEPTEMBER 1, 1861, WHEN KENTUCKYS NEUTRALITY ENDED ABRUPTLY AS FEDERAL TROOPS ENTERED THE STATE. CONFEDERATES PROMPTLY FOLLOWED SUIT FROM CAMPS IN NORTHERN TENNESSEE. GENERAL POLK SEIZED COLUMBUS. BUCKNER MARCHED INTO BOWLING GREEN AND ZOLLICOFFER ADVANCED THROUGH THE CUMBERLAND GAP TO CUMBERLAND FORD. THE WESTERN CONFLICT HAD BEGAN.

ON SEPTEMBER 18<sup>TH</sup>, 1861, THE KENTUCKY LEGISLATURE VOTED TO ALLIGN WITH THE UNION. A DECISION THAT CAUSED FAMILIES AND FRIENDSHIPS TO SPLIT APART. THE KENTUCKY BRIGADE AND KENTUCKY ENLISTMENTS INTO THE CONFEDERATE ARMY WERE KNOWN AS " KENTUCKY ORPHANS ", POLITICAL OUTCASTS TO BE SHOT IF THEY CROSSED STATE LINES. THEY WERE ORPHANS TO THEIR STATE AND THEIR FAMILIES WITHIN THE BLOODY STRIFE OF THE WESTERN CAMPAIGN AND CONFLICT OF THE CIVIL WAR.

SINCE OUTLAWED BY THE STATE OF KENTUCKY, THEY ENLISTED IN THE STATE OF TENNESSEE WITHIN A REGIMENT THAT WAS ORGANIZED AT JACKSON, TENNESSEE, THE 12<sup>TH</sup> TENNESSEE INFANTRY REGIMENT, COMPANY E. IN JULY, 1861, THIS REGIMENT REPORTED TO UNION CITY, TENNESSEE, WITH 737 MEN, ARMED WITH FLINTLOCK MUSKETS. IN SEPTEMBER, IT MOVED TO COLUMBUS, KENTUCKY, IN THE BRIGADE OF COLONEL ROBERT M. RUSSELL. IN OCTOBER, THIS BRIGADE WAS IN THE DIVISION OF BRIGADIER GENERAL J. PILLOW. THE BRIGADE WAS ON THE MISSOURI SIDE OF THE RIVER AT THE BATTLE OF BELMONT AND BORE THE FIRST SHOCK OF THE FEDERAL ATTACK.

AFTER THE FALL OF FORT DONELSON IN FEBRUARY 1862, COLUMBUS WAS EVACUATED AND THE BRIGADE MOVED TO CORINTH, MISSISSIPPI. IN THE BATTLE OF SHILOH, APRIL 6<sup>TH</sup> AND 7<sup>TH</sup>, 1862, RUSSELLS BRIGADE CONSISTED OF THE 11<sup>TH</sup> LOUISIANA, 12<sup>TH</sup>, 13<sup>TH</sup> AND 22<sup>ND</sup> TENNESSEE INFANTRY REGIMENTS. IT WAS WITHIN THE DIVISION OF BRIGADIER GENERAL CHARLES CLARK AND FOUGHT ON BOTH DAYS. ( PVT. W. C. BUSHART, COMPANY "I", FIFTH TENNESSEE INFANTRY, KILLED APRIL 6, 1862, FIELD OF SHILOH ).

ON MAY 15, 1862, COMPANY E OF THE 12<sup>TH</sup> TENNESSEE INFANTRY WAS TRANSFERRED TO BECOME COMPANY "L" OF THE 3<sup>RD</sup> MOUNTED INFANTRY REGIMENT OF KENTUCKY ( KENTUCKY BRIGADE ), ARMY OF THE MISSISSIPPI RESERVE CORPS, DEPARTMENT #2 ENGAGING IN THE CORINTH CAMPAIGN, VICKSBURG BOMBARDMENTS, BATON ROUGE, COFFEEVILLE AND THE SECOND AND FINAL ASSUALT ON VICKSBURG FROM APRIL TO JULY, 1863 ( BATTLES OF RAYMOND, CHAMPION HILL AND THE SIEGE OF JACKSON, MISSISSIPPI ).


COMPANY "L" WAS A VETERAN GROUP OF KENTUCKY BORN TROOPS AND WHILE THEY ENCAMPED AT DEMOPOLIS, ABOUT THE 1<sup>ST</sup> OF MARCH, 1864, THEY RECEIVED INFORMATION THAT THE HAD ORDERED THEM TO REPORT TO GENERAL NATHAN B. FORREST, THEN IN THE VICINITY OF COLUMBUS, MISSISSIPPI, WHO WAS TO HAVE THEM MOUNTED AND PLACED IN HIS COMMAND.

ON MARCH 14, 1864, THEY WERE MOUNTED AND UNDER THE COMMAND OF FORREST. THEY MOVED THROUGH TENNESSEE, CAPTURED UNION CITY AND ATTACKED THE UNION HELD CITY OF PADUCAH, KENTUCKY. AT THIS TIME THE COMMAND VISITED THEIR HOMES FOR THE FIRST TIME IN THREE YEARS OF THE WAR, OR, SINCE THE WAR BEGAN.

THE COMPANY FINISHED THE WAR WITHIN THE DIVISION OF BRIGADIER GENERAL ABRAM BUFORD AND BRIGADE COMMANDER COLONEL A. P. THOMPSON, FORREST CAVALRY CORPS, DEPARTMENT OF ALABAMA, MISSISSIPPI AND EAST LOUISIANA.

MY INTRODUCTION TO MY REPORTS IS BEST DESCRIBED BY MR. SHELBY FOOTE, HISTORIAN AS FOLLOWS :

" ANY UNDERSTANDING OF THIS NATION HAS TO BE BASED AND I MEAN REALLY BASED, ON AN UNDERSTANDING OF THE CIVIL WAR. I BELIEVE THAT FIRMLY, IT DEFINED US. THE REVOLUTION DID WHAT IT DID. OUR INVOLVEMENT WITH THE EUROPEAN WARS BEGINNING WITH THE FIRST WORLD WAR, DID WHAT IT DID. BUT THE CIVIL WAR DEFINED US WHAT WE ARE, AND IT OPENED TO US WHAT WE BECAME , GOOD AND BAD THINGS. AND IT IS VERY NECESSARY, IF YOU ARE GOING TO UNDERSTAND THE AMERICAN CHARACTER IN THE TWENTIETH CENTURY, TO LEARN ABOUT THIS ENORMOUS CATASTROPHE OF THE NINETEENTH CENTURY. IT WAS THE CROSSROADS OF OUR BEING, AND IT WAS A HELL OF A CROSSROADS.

**Description:** After Gen. Braxton Bragg's defeat at Perryville, Kentucky, October 8, 1862, he and his Confederate Army of the Mississippi retreated, reorganized, and were redesignated as the Army of Tennessee. They then advanced to Murfreesboro, Tennessee, and prepared to go into winter quarters. Maj. Gen. William S. Rosecrans's Union Army of the Cumberland followed Bragg from Kentucky to Nashville. Rosecrans left Nashville on December 26, with about 44,000 men, to defeat Bragg's army of more than 37,000. He found Bragg's army on December 29 and went into camp that night, within hearing distance of the Rebels. At dawn on the 31st, Bragg's men attacked the Union right flank. The Confederates had driven the Union line back to the Nashville Pike by 10:00 am but there it held. Union reinforcements arrived from Rosecrans's left in the late forenoon to bolster the stand, and before fighting stopped that day the Federals had established a new, strong line. On New Years Day, both armies marked time. Bragg surmised that Rosecrans would now withdraw, but the next morning he was still in position. In late afternoon, Bragg hurled a division at a Union division that, on January 1, had crossed Stones River and had taken up a strong position on the bluff east of the river. The Confederates drove most of the Federals back across McFadden's Ford, but with the assistance of artillery, the Federals repulsed the attack, compelling the Rebels to retire to their original position. Bragg left the field on the January 4-5, retreating to Shelbyville and Tullahoma, Tennessee. Rosecrans did not pursue, but as the Confederates retired, he claimed the victory. Stones River boosted Union morale. The Confederates had been thrown back in the east, west, and in the Trans-Mississippi.

Dear Mr. Bushart:

Thank you for your interest in Stones River National Battlefield. I am sorry I am unable to provide you with an exact location of Pvt. Bushert's burial site in the Stones River National Cemetery. He is listed on the *Roll of Honor*, but his records do not have a grave number on them. This is not an unusual situation. All of the Union soldiers killed during the battle were buried in mass graves on the battlefield. Their comrades attempted to record and mark the burials, but some of that information was lost between early 1863 and 1865 when the National Cemetery was established. Since his name is on the *Roll of Honor*, we know that Pvt. Bushert is buried here, but his remains could not be positively identified upon reinterment. Therefore, he is buried in one of the nearly 2,000 graves for unknown soldiers

As we discussed on the phone, I have enclosed a number of items in this letter to assist you in your research on Pvt. Jacob Bushert, Company A, 74<sup>th</sup> Ohio Volunteer Infantry. You will find a partial copy of Company A's roster showing Pvt. Bushert. You should use this information when you contact the National Archives and Records Administration (NATF Form 80 enclosed) and the Ohio Historical Society for more detailed records. I have also enclosed a brief unit history copied from Frederick Dyer's *A Compendium of the War of the Rebellion* and a collection of after action reports taken from *The War of the Rebellion: A Compilation of the Official Records of the Union and Confederate Armies*.
