Know ye, That Marcus P. Parmelee a Private of Captain [crossed out] Lieut [sic] [illegible] Company, (D.) 82d Regiment of Indiana Infantry VOLUNTEERS, who was enrolled on the Fifteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty two to serve Three. years or during the war, is hereby Discharged from the service of the United States this 3d day of July, 1865, at Indianapolis Indiana by reason of Surgeons [sic] Certificate of disability.

Said Marcus P. Parmelee was born in Johnson Co. in the State of Indiana, is 24 years of age, five feet ten inches high, Light complexion, Light eyes, Light hair, and by occupation, when enrolled, a Farmer.

Given at Indianapolis Ind. this Third day of July, 1865.
