**1836-1891**

DANIEL DICKINSON REDMOND was in the first group of volunteers for service in the Civil War from **BENTON COUNTY, INDIANA**. The group went to **CAMP TIPPECANOE** at **LaFAYETTE, INDIANA**. There, he was inducted as a Corporal, 14 June, 1861 and was assigned to *Company D, 15<sup>th</sup> Indiana Infantry*.

Co. D was in Indianapolis until 1 JULY, 1861. It was then moved by rail to Cincinnati, Ohio and on to Clarksburg, West Virginia. The men marched to the **RICH MOUNTAIN BATTLE** of 12 July, 1861. The Company was then moved to Elkwater Valley, West Virginia. They took part in the battles at **GREEN BRIER, SHILOH, and CORINTH**, then moved to Louisville, Kentucky. They were at Nashville, Tennessee, where General Buehl was replaced by General Rosecrans.

Corporal D.D.Redmond was promoted to Sgt. 1 August, 1861; to 1<sup>st</sup> Sgt. 3 May, 1862. In November, 1862, he was discharged to accept a commission as 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant by order of Major General Rosecrans.

**Lieutenant Redmond** was promoted to 1<sup>st</sup> Lieutenant 24 December, 1862. Co. D was in battle at **STONE RIVER, Tennessee**, 31 December, 1862-1,2 January, 1863. 197 of the 440 men in the company were lost, including its Captain Richard Templeton. 28 February, 1863, Lieutenant Redmond was promoted to Captain, Vice, then mustered as Captain, 10 May, 1863.

Company D was at **TULLAHOMA**, 24 June, 1863, **PELHAM, Tennessee**, 17 August, 1863, then to **CHATTANOOGA** until 9 September, 1863. At **MISSIONARY RIDGE**, the Company lost 202 men of 334.

They were at Knoxville, Tennessee until February, 1864, then returned to Chattanooga under General Steadman. The Company remained there until 16 June, 1864, when it was returned to Indianapolis to be mustered out.

Co. D 15<sup>th</sup> Ind. Inf. was transferred to the 17<sup>th</sup> until discharge 8 August, 1864. "Cap" Redmond, as his men called him, held various detached assignments. One was the improvement of the Indianapolis-Lafayette highway. During May, 1863, he was on special duty attending a General Court Martial. From November, 1863 to January, 1864, he was on recruiting duty in Indiana, per Dept. S.F.O. 302.

After discharge on 29 June, 1864, he returned to Benton County. There he married Sarah Scott, daughter of Samuel S. Scott, on Christmas Day, 1874.

CAPTAIN DANIEL DICKINSON REDMOND

Daniel D. Redmond was in the first group of volunteers for service in the Civil War from Benton County, Indiana. The group went to Camp Tippecanoe at Lafayette, Indiana. There he was inducted into the Army as a Corporal, 14 June 1861 and was assigned to Company D 15th Indiana Infantry.

Co. D, moved by rail from Indianapolis, 1 July 1861 to Cincinnati, and on to Clarksburg, now in West Virginia. The men marched to the Battle of Rich Mountain on 12 July. The Company was moved to Elkwater Valley, West Va. They took part in the battles of Green Brier, Shiloh and Corinth. They then moved to Louisville, Ky. They were at Nashville, Tenn., where General Buell was replaced by Major General Wm. S. Rosecrans.

1 Aug. 1861 Corp. Redmond was promoted to Sergeant, then to 1st Sergeant on 3 May 1862. On 23 Nov. 1862 he was discharged to accept a Commission as 2nd Lieutenant, by order of Major General Rosecrans.

Lt. Redmond was promoted to 1st Lt. 24 Dec. 1862. Co. D was in battle at Stone River, Tenn. 31 Dec. 1862 to 2 Jan. 1863. 197 of the 440 men in the Company were lost, including its Captain, Richard Templeton. At Murphyboro, Tenn., 28 Feb. 1863 Lt. Redmond was promoted to Captain, Vice. He was mustered as Captain on 10 May 1863, to date from 8 March 1863.

Co. D was at Tullahoma, Tenn., 24 June, at Pelham, Tenn 17 Aug., then on to Chattanooga until 9 Sept. 1863. At Missionary Ridge, the Company lost 202 men of 334.

The survivors were at Knoxville until Feb. 1864, then returned to Chattanooga under General Steadman. The Company remained there until 16 June, when it was transferred to Indianapolis to be mustered out.

Co. D 15th Indiana Inf. was transferred to the 17th until discharged on 8 Aug. 1864.

Cap Redmond, as he was known to his men, held various detached assignments. One was road improvement on the Indianapolis-Lafayette highway. Another, during May 1863 he was on special duty attending a General Courtmartial. From November 1863 to January 1864 he was on recruiting duty in Indiana. (Per Dep. S. F.O. # 302 Hdqtrs, Army of the Cumberland.)

After discharge, 29 June 1864, Cap Redmond returned to Benton County, Indiana where, 10 years later he married Sarah (Sally) Scott, daughter of Samuel S. Scott, on Christmas Day 1874.



Pursuit to Booneville May 30-June 12. Buell's Campaign in Northern Alabama and Middle Tennessee June to August. March to Louisville, Kentucky, in pursuit of Bragg August 21-September 26. Pursuit of Bragg into Kentucky October 1-22. Battle of Perryville, Kentucky, October 8 (Reserve). March to Nashville, Tennessee, October 22-November 7, and duty there until December 26. March to relief of Knoxville, Tennessee, November 28-December 8. Duty at Knoxville and vicinity until February, 1864. Ordered to Chattanooga, Tennessee, and garrison duty there**


**until June. Mustered out June 16, 1864 (expiration of term). Veterans and Recruits transferred to 17th Indiana Infantry.**


Charles Sylvester Hancock married Nellie Louisa Richards-Jordan

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### Died.

Monday, March, 23d at his residence in this city from Necrosis of the jaw, D. D. Redmond aged 54 years.

Captain Redmond was a native of Binghamton, Broome county N. Y. and was named for the famous statesman and orator, Daniel S. Dickinson of the same county and state. The breaking out of the war found him a resident of Indiana. One of the first to respond to the call for troops he went out in the 15th Indiana with the rank of lieutenant. At the expiration of his term of service in the 15th he joined the 43d Ind. as captain of company D and served until the end of the war.

He came to this county in 1867 settled on a claim near Syracuse, and has resided here since that time. About two years ago he was afflicted with the loss of his wife and a daughter. Since that time, broken in health from service in the war, and in spirit from the loss of his closest companion and friend, his lines of life have been hard. With a family of four to support and only a \$6 pension as an income, the "old soldier" who perished his life for this country, finally laid it down in an abode of poverty in the arms of war, with only charity to weep at a burial paid for from the funds of the county. So goes the world! Gorgeous obsequies to day from one end of the country to the other over a general whose body lies in state to-morrow, a soldier in the same war, and the same battles, is laid away in a "sound of drum, or funeral note" is heard in the land.

Capt. Redmond's illness was of long and painful duration, but through it all his faithful comrades of the G. A. R. have watched and cared for him, and did for him all that was possible to do. He had his faults, he had his virtues. He was a "Soldier of the Republic," a "Defender of the Flag" and no more patriotic American answers "roll call" on the "other side."

DIED—At his residence in this city Monday evening, at 6 o'clock, D. D. Redmond, age 54 years. The deceased had lived here for about four years, had been in poor health for a number of years, and for the last two months was not able to leave his room; he was a member of the G. A. R. Post of this city. His wife died here in September, 1888, and by his death it leaves four small children three boys and one girl, orphans, the oldest being about 18, the youngest 6 years old, without a home. The citizens will see that they are cared for until a suitable home can be provided for them. They are smart and industrious children.

At her home near this city, August 12, after an illness of ten days, Mrs. Sarah Scott Redmond, aged forty years, five months and twenty-seven days.

"She has found the blessed island, where earth's toils and sorrows cease. She wears the sacred lotus in the holy Land of peace."

Sarah Scott was born in Ohio in the year 1848, and was married to Mr. Daniel Redmond, December 25th, 1874. When a young girl she became a member of the M. E. church, and has always lead a consistent Christian life, devoted to her husband and children she has borne him. How sad it is, not for her, but for them, that she should die and leave them all—the stricken husband and the helpless little ones. How he will miss her counsel and they her all abiding love. Is there balm in Gilead to heal such wounds as these? We can only offer them the sympathy of a heart heavy with the same great grief, and say:

"Speak to each other from Thy throne above, Whisper some message of tenderest love."
