Malvern Hill Barnum, who has just been transferred from Fort Sam Houston, Tex., to Camp Grant at Rockford, Ill., to take command of a brigade of the 8th National Army division, and promoted to the rank of Brigadier General, is well known in New Albany. He was married in New Albany a number of years ago to Miss Martha M. ... daughter of the late Col. ...

Gen. Pershing, who then was a Captain in the Regular Army, was one of the attendants at the wedding. When Gen. Pershing was sent to France he expressed a desire that Col.
