USING NATIONAL REGISTER NOMINATIONS IN PREPARING HALS SHORT FORMAT HISTORIES

These instructions are intended to explain how National Register nominations can be used to facilitate the preparation of Historic American Landscapes Survey (HALS) documentation using the <u>HALS Short Format History Template</u>. The short format is required to enter the annual HALS Challenge, a national competition related to a selected historical or cultural landscape theme. Often, a property associated with the theme has been listed in the National Register. The nomination can be used to prepare the short format documentation. These instructions are intended to facilitate the conversion of the information contained in National Register nominations to HALS documentation.

HALS and the National Register: A Logical Partnership

Owners of historic properties may be interested in the documentation of their property for the HALS program. The documentation is submitted to the Library of Congress and provides a permanent record of the history of the landscape and its appearance at the time of documentation. State historic preservation offices are in a good position to inform their constituents of this option, and consultants may be interested in offering HALS documentation as an addition to preparation of a nomination. Many owners would be delighted to have documentation about their landscape filed at the Library of Congress.

Well-prepared National Register nominations contain a wealth of information, and HALS documentation can make it accessible to a wider audience. HALS documentation is copyright free and preserved in perpetuity and made publicly accessible online by the Library of Congress. The HABS/HAER/HALS Collection is one of the largest and most heavily used collections in the Prints and Photographs Division and constitutes the nation's largest archive of historic architectural, engineering, and landscape documentation.

HALS provides baseline documentation for practical and academic pursuits such as rehabilitation and interpretation. HALS documentation is not a listing, nomination, or designation, so please do not cite National Register criteria as part of a HALS report.

Using the HALS/National Register Comparison Table

The official <u>HALS Guidelines</u> should be followed for any HALS documentation project. HALS requires several fields not listed in the table below, which focuses on fields the National Register and HALS have in common. Some National Register documentation will not be needed or may need recrafting for HALS purposes. Note that neither program has length requirements or restrictions, but both types of documentation are intended to be summaries. For fairly recent listings, the National Register photographs and site plans may be usable, but all graphic materials should be field checked for accuracy. Please see the HALS instructions about potential copyright issues with graphics.

This includes the context for development of the particular landscape type. | Sources | | 9 Major Bibliographical References | | Include a consistently formatted list of the sources used, including books, articles, surveys, reports, brochures, websites, and other material related to this site. The National Register and HALS encourage use of the <i>Chicago Manual of Style</i> (most recent edition). Do not include the entire bibliography of sources listed in the National Register nomination; focus on those that were clearly used, as evidenced by footnotes. Cite the National Register nomination in the Sources section. |

Figures and photos lifted from National Register nominations must be accompanied by Release and Assignment forms. Be aware that National Register graphics may have copyright issues. |

Additional Guidance on Using National Register Nominations for HALS Documentation

- 1. **Copyright cautions.** Include National Register figures and photos <u>very selectively</u>. The HALS program will assume there are copyright issues with submitted graphic materials unless they are clearly in the public domain or are covered by a signed copy of the HALS Release and Assignment form. Materials must be copyright-free to be included within the Library of Congress collection. The HABS/HAER/HALS collection is in the public domain, therefore, the authors/delineators, although given credit for their work, do not retain copyright.
- 2. **Release and Assignment Form.** Completed copies of the HALS Release and Assignment Form(s) must accompany all donated HALS histories to cover the author's (historian's) written work and graphics. The form is provided in the HALS Short Format History Template. If the nomination is the primary source of the HALS documentation, a signed copy of the HALS Release and Assignment form from the nomination author is required. If the nomination is one of many sources for the HALS report, it can be listed in the "Sources" section, and the nomination author will not be required to sign the Release and Assignment form.
- 3. **Plagiarism cautions.** Do not plagiarize. Information taken verbatim from someone else's work, must be put it in quotes, with the source footnoted. Information should only be put in quotations if it presents information as an original thought, idea, or voice, or serves to underscore the point being made; otherwise paraphrase the information. Quotes should not be used merely to avoid writing the information.
- 4. Lifting material from National Register nominations. National Register text can be quoted from a nomination with appropriate citations, or information may be used as a source for new text. In either case, it is important to credit the nomination author. If the nomination is the primary source of information, credit its author (this person is named in "Form Prepared By" section) in the "Historian" and "Sources" sections of the HALS report or in the introduction to the report. For example, this might be stated:

Except where noted, this report has been adapted, with minor additions and updates, from the National Register of Historic Places Registration Form for (Property Name) written by (Nomination Author's Name, Year) by (HALS Report Author's Name).

5. Scholarly standards apply. Both the National Register and HALS require sources of documentation to be consistently cited via footnotes and Bibliography/Source entries. Footnotes are preferred to endnotes, and the format of all citations should follow the *Chicago Manual of Style* (latest edition). Please convert to *Chicago* if another style guide was used in the National Register nomination.
