### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Jacksonville (1970 population: 20,553), the seat of Morgan County, lies about 35 miles west of Springfield, the state capital, and 90 miles north of St. Louis, Mo., in the midst of rich, gently undulating prairie. Except in the immediate vicinity of watercourses, particularly the Illinois River on the west, the county has few marked topographic features. Jacksonville itself, almost encircled by the Mauvaiseterre Creek and its tributaries, lies along an east-west ridge, the land rising steadily and perceptibly as one proceeds west from the town square, reaching its highest point at College Hill - the Illinois College campus - and then dropping off rather quickly, particularly to the south.

The Jacksonville Historic District is confined to this west side of the city and includes most of the area within a rectangle formed by Dunlap, Dayton, Finlay, and Anna and their extensions. The precise boundary of the district was drawn on the basis of the visual quality of the streetscape as an expression of Jacksonville's pre-World War I character. The district is not limited, therefore, to the aristocratically elegant east-west residential streets - State, College, and Mound/Grove - but also includes several more middle-class, yet nonetheless fine and substantial streets, e.g. Church, Lafayette, Webster, etc. The eastern boundary reflects the proximity of Jacksonville's central business district - now so thoroughly modernized as to prevent its inclusion - and its expansion into the residential west side. The southern, western, and northern boundaries are determined by areas beyond that are dominated by minor and/or recent structures. This change in character is usually quite sharp, except on the southeast, where the more gradual transition is mirrored in the more irregular boundary. The area of Lafayette, Douglas, Fayette and Diamond, though quite old, has little remaining character, while Douglas and Lafayette -- particularly Douglas -- between Diamond and Caldwell are mainly the work of the 1920's; this entire area, therefore, has been excluded.

Land use within the district is primarily residential with major educational -- Illinois College and two public schools -- and institutional exceptions -- the Illinois School for the Deaf. There are some properties used for commercial purposes near the eastern end of the district and industrial uses are restricted to the vicinity of Lafayette and Church. Six of seven religious uses are east of Kosciusko and there appear to be no federal properties in the district. All in all, that part of the district northeast of College and Diamond is relatively mixed, while the remainder -- with the exceptions noted above -- is almost purely residential.

Density in the district is moderately low throughout and even lower on State, College, Grove, and Mound, where the largest homes and lots are situated. The western reaches of College and State, with the open space of Duncan Park, considerable open land on the Illinois College campus, and very large front yards, present a decidedly ornamental appearance. The smallest lots -- and, hence, the highest density -- are in the southeast corner of the district, but even here the streetscape is still quite park-like. Large numbers of mature shade trees, shrubs and other decorative plants contribute to this mood in almost all parts of the district. Virtually all residences are single-family and detached and the great majority are 2 or 2½ stories high and of generally large proportions. Frame construction is dominant, but there is a good proportion of masonry. The largest structures in the district -- all of masonry construction -- are those of Illinois College and the Illinois School for the Deaf.

Jacksonville's street pattern is that of a rectangular grid aligned along major co-ordinates. In the historic district, and particularly in its western half, the orientation is more towards the east-west streets with the north-south streets often reduced to mere connectors. No street bears particularly heavy traffic, although College, once a state highway, is at times relatively congested. Residences front on all streets,

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though here again the east-west thoroughfares are somewhat preferred -- corner lots, for instance, generally front on them, not the north-south streets.

Of 696 structures encompassed within the Jacksonville Historic District, excluding garages and other incidental buildings, 152 have been evaluated as possessing special architectural and/or historical significance and an additional 130 were photographed by the Illinois Historic Structures Survey. The remaining older structures (368) are of relatively high quality and often go beyond mere background. Recent structures (29) and intrusions (17) account for somewhat less than 7% of those extant, remarkably low considering that Jacksonville has never been a particularly stagnated city. With 10 of the 17 intrusions located at or within two blocks of the intersection of State and Prairie, large parts of the district are completely intrusion-free. The most unfortunate intrusion in the district is a game parlor at the southwest corner of State and Kosciusko, while a potentially disastrous drive-in bank at State and Church is ameliorated by the fact that most of the property is given over to lawn. Modernizations and inappropriate siding materials occur in most parts of the district, but not yet in numbers sufficient to cause immediate concern.

Almost all architectural styles popular in Illinois from 1830 to the mid-1930's -- including a number of sub-types -- are represented in the Jacksonville Historic District, most of them in significance. The oldest structure in the district is Beecher Hall of Illinois College (v.No.22 below), built in 1829 in the late Federal style. There are several examples of Greek Revival (including Nos.12,25,32,40 below) and a great abundance of fine Italianate (incl.Nos.3,4,8,9,11,16,19,26,29,31,35,36,39,41,45 below), including some with a strong Second Empire flavor (No.2 below) and others colored by Queen Anne, Gothic Revival (Nos.10,30 below), and Beaux Arts Classicism (No.21 below). The Queen Anne is also widespread (incl.Nos.14,15,17,20,27 below), and even more common is a late Queen Anne with strong Classical Revival tendencies (incl.Nos.7,28,33 below). The Classical and Medieval Revivals of the later 19th and earlier 20th centuries are present to a degree, but not in any extraordinary significance. A number of other types are numerically inferior to the Italianate and Queen Anne, but are all represented by excellent examples: non-archaeological Gothic (No.42), Richardsonian Romanesque (No.24), Fowler's Octagon House (No.13), Shingle Style (No.18), Stil Moderne (No.1), the Prairie School (Nos.5,23 -- both by Spencer and Powers), the California Bungalow (No.38), and the mixed forms of 19th century eclectic (Nos.6,44).

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Regardless of any historical associations that might attach, the Jacksonville Historic District would be of major significance on the basis of its architecture alone. Not only is there a large number of truly superior structures, not only are the relationships between these structures strong and clear -- the total ensemble also embraces excellent examples of almost every major style popular in Illinois between ca.1830 and the Great Depression. Admittedly, Italianate and Queen Anne dominate the streetscape, if only by sheer number, but that hardly renders other styles obscure. From the late Federal of Beecher Hall to the Prairie School of Spencer and Powers and beyond, the Jacksonville Historic District presents one of the most complete illustrations of Illinois' architectural history as can be found.

There are, however, strong historical associations as well. Two major institutions, Illinois College and the Illinois School for the Deaf -- both firsts of their respective kinds in the state -- played and continue to play a vital role in the city. They, together with other, similar institutions in other parts of the city, made Jacksonville one of the state's most important cities during the mid-19th century. Individuals of note are also connected with the area, chief among them Joseph Duncan, one of the key men in the early history of the State of Illinois, and Newton Bateman, Illinois' first State Superintendent of Public Education and a major figure in 19th century American education.

The state of preservation in the district is remarkably high and, except for a few unfortunate structures near its eastern end, most of the district is virtually free of intrusions. What has come down to the present, then, is a nearly intact section of one of Illinois' premier 19th century cities, rich in history and, if possible, even richer in architectural beauty.

## HISTORY

Jacksonville is one of several Illinois towns and cities that owe their very existence to the selection of their future sites as the seats of government for newly created counties. Unlike that of most of its counterparts, however, neither Jacksonville's history nor its character has been dominated by the cause of its nativity. Rather, it has been the several institutions -- both educational and charitable -- locating there that have formed the city.

Morgan County was established on 31 January 1823 and, after a two-year interim when Olmstead's Mounds served as the temporary county seat, the site of Jacksonville was selected as the permanent seat -- on 6 January 1825 -- and the new city duly laid out and platted on 10 March 1825. The survey was carried out by Johnston Shelton, using State and Main streets -- the former a public road between Springfield and Naples -- as the base lines. Growth was immediate, but neither different from nor more substantial than that of other new county seats -- until 1828, when the Rev. John Ellis settled there and determined to found a college. With the assistance of prominent local citizens, notably William

Posey and Samuel Lockwood, and seven Yale University students, the state's first college, Illinois College, was organized in 1829 and the first class held 4 January 1830 (see also No.22 below). Illinois College -- and its adjunct, the Jacksonville Female Academy, which opened in 1833 and was merged with the college in 1903 -- of great importance in themselves also established the future prosperity and character of the fledgling town of 446 (1830 population).

A second institution had a nearly equal effect on the city, particularly on the west side, where it, like the college, has always been located: The Illinois School for the Deaf (see also No.21 below). The school was established by act of the Illinois Legislature 23 February 1839 as the Illinois Institution for the Education of the Deaf and Dumb, the same act naming a number of prominent men as trustees, including Joseph Duncan (v.No.34), Julian Sturtevant (v.No.37), George Chambers (v.No.40), and Porter Clay (v.No.43). Land for the school was donated by the citizens of Morgan County and, after allowing the rather meagre state appropriation to accumulate, the first building (the south wing of the present structure) was erected in 1843.

Though speaking only of Illinois College, the writer of the 1878 county history perhaps best expresses the effect both institutions had on the west side: "At the time of the building of the Illinois College, all that tract of land lying between that institution and the public square was in its primitive condition, or cultivated as a farm. Where now are the finest residences, the most beautiful yards, and the best shaded streets, was then open prairie, or used for farm purposes." And though many structures were yet to be built in the area -- particularly from ca.1890-1910 -- its character, and with it that of the historic district, was firmly established by 1878: the two institutions set among the city's finest residences.

With two prominent institutions already prospering, Jacksonville seems to have had little difficulty attracting others to further enhance its reputation as an educational and charitable center. The Illinois Female College was established by the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1846 and flourished for decades. The Illinois Institution for the Education of the Blind, organized and supported by private citizens in 1841-2, was incorporated by the state legislature on 13 January 1843 and located on the east side of town. A third institution, again the first of its kind in Illinois, the Central Hospital for the Insane was opened in 1851, becoming the major force on the city's south side. Yet a fourth, the Institution for the Education of Feeble Minded Children was chartered in 1865 and located on the Gov.Duncan property (v.Nos.33-4). No wonder that the Chicago Daily Tribune of 6 January 1875 could begin a commentary on the city, "Jacksonville, as everybody knows, is a city of State institutions..." A further, yet significantly later addition to Jacksonville's institutional economy is MacMurray College on the city's east side.

Apart from, though obviously heavily relying upon these several institutions, Jacksonville itself grew apace. By the time of its incorporation as a town, 3 February 1840, and the arrival of the first railroad, the Morgan and Sangamon, in 1840, Jacksonville's population numbered 1,900. Other railroads were built through the city -- the Chicago and Alton (1857), the Jacksonville Northwestern and Southeastern, the Toledo, Wabash and Western, and the Peoria, Pekin and Jacksonville (all three before 1885) -- but

were probably not as influential on growth -- 2,745 in 1850, 5,528 in 1860, 9,365 in 1870, and ca.13,000 in 1885 -- as they would have been in a city with a less unusual economic base. Incorporated as a city in 1867, Jacksonville has never been a major manufacturing center, despite a number of relatively early industries. First among these was the Jacksonville Woolen Mills of Joseph Capp and Sons (v.No.9). Others included the Ellis, Shields and Dangerfield Foundry (1859); the Jacksonville Shirt Factory; C.H.Dunbrack and Co., gentlemen's furnishing goods; the manufacture of paper barrels, carriages and buggies, candy, cigars, and flour; and the Jacksonville Union Stockyards.

The 20th century has wrought surprisingly few changes in this early picture. There have been additions to the industrial base. The institutions -- especially the state institutions -- are no longer as central as they were during the 19th century. And the center of the city has been "modernized." But the west side -- the area of the historic district -- is still marked by the forces that created it: Illinois College, the Illinois School for the Deaf, and the homes of the city's prominent men and women of the past.

The School for the Deaf has occupied this tract, one mile west of the town square, since its inception. See also No.33.

Beecher Hall is the first and hence oldest college building in the State of Illinois. It has served a variety of educational purposes over its long history, most significantly as the state's first medical school (1843-8).

Illinois College, though not chartered until 1835, was founded in 1829 and has played a major role in Jacksonville's history ever since. The College's first president was Edward Beecher (1830-44) and through him there was a strong, early connection with the intellectual life of New England. His brother, Henry Ward Beecher, and his sister, Harriet Beecher Stowe, lectured and/or visited, while a second brother, Thomas, was graduated from the school. Led by Edward Beecher, the College was also a major force in Illinois for the abolition of slavery. Ralph Waldo Emerson, Bronson Alcott, Mark Twain, Horace Greeley, and Wendell Phillips were among the early speakers and lecturers -- as was Abraham Lincoln. Prominent graduates of Illinois College have included Richard Yates, Governor of Illinois during the Civil War -- the school's first graduate (in 1835) and one of four alumni to become state governors -- Newton Bateman (v.No.42), and William Jennings Bryan, an 1881 graduate. He was very active in local politics, serving as a town trustee (1845, 1848), in the City Council, and as Mayor (1874). He was one of the organizers of the City Gas, Light, and Coke Co. (1856) and its superintendent for more than 25 years. Mr. King was also instrumental in securing the location of the state institutions for the blind and for the insane in Jacksonville.

33. DR. PHILIP GOODE GILLETT HOUSE

1235 West College  
Built in 1900

Though not one of the founders of the Illinois School for the Deaf (v. No. 21), Philip Gillett was instrumental in the institution's early development. He was named superintendent of the school in April 1856 and immediately set upon re-organizing the facility, in a very real sense almost re-establishing it. He directed the School for the Deaf for decades and also served as superintendent of an experimental school for the education of feeble-minded children, whose establishment he had secured in 1865.

Dr. Gillett originally lived in a house immediately east of 1235. It, however, was destroyed by fire.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE

34. GOV. JOSEPH DUNCAN HOUSE

4 Duncan Place  
Built in 1834; since greatly altered

Joseph Duncan was one of the most influential men in the early history of Illinois' Statehood. His political career began in 1823 with election to the Illinois Senate, a post he resigned in 1826 to serve as Illinois' only elected representative in the U.S. Congress. He was re-elected to the House until 1834, when he was elected 6th Governor of Illinois (1834-8). Specifically in Jacksonville, Gov. Duncan was a member of the board of trustees of Illinois College from 1835 until his death in 1844, initiated the subscription for the purchase of land for the State Deaf and Dumb Institution (February 1839), and served as the latter institution's first President of Trustees. Later, the home and grounds were used by the Institution for the Education of Feeble Minded Children.

Northeast corner Park and Grove  
Built ca. 1858

Julian Sturtevant was among the founders and original trustees of Illinois College, one of the seven Yale theology students who helped established a college in the Mississippi Valley. He was also the school's first faculty member and the one who, on 4 January 1830, first met with students (9 of them) and inaugurated the institution. In 1832, he was named Professor of Mathematics and Natural Philosophy, holding that position until 1844, when he succeeded Edward Beecher to the school's presidency. He retired from this position in 1876, but rejoined the faculty and did not finally retire from Illinois College until 1885 when he was 80. Dr. Sturtevant was also a much-published author.

Newton Bateman is one of the most significant men in the history of Illinois Education. A graduate of Illinois College, he was principal of the West District School in Jacksonville (1850 et seq.), County Commissioner of Schools for Morgan County (1856-8), and principal of the Jacksonville Female Academy (1858). That latter year, he was elected State Superintendent of Public Instruction, a post he held for seven terms (1859-75, excepting 1863-5). As State Superintendent, he published a series of annual reports that placed him in the forefront of educational writers and earned him a national reputation. Newton Bateman also took a major part in the successful effort to establish the State Normal University (1857, at Normal, Ill.) and was a member of the three-man committee that persuaded Congress to establish the Bureau of Education (1867). In 1875, he accepted the presidency of Knox College in Galesburg (Ill.) and upon retiring from that position in 1893 became general editor of the Historical Encyclopedia of Illinois, one of the standard references works on state and local history.

The house itself, if inappropriate siding were removed and other restoration work carried out properly, is a good example of the Gothic Cottage and would be of architectural significance.

Isaac Morrison, a prominent attorney, came to Jacksonville from Kentucky in 1851. He was a delegate to the 1856 Republican Convention at Bloomington, Ill., and to the same party's national convention at Baltimore in 1864. He served three terms in the Illinois House (1877-91, 1883-5) and was chairman of the Committee on Judiciary in the 30th and 32nd General Assemblies.

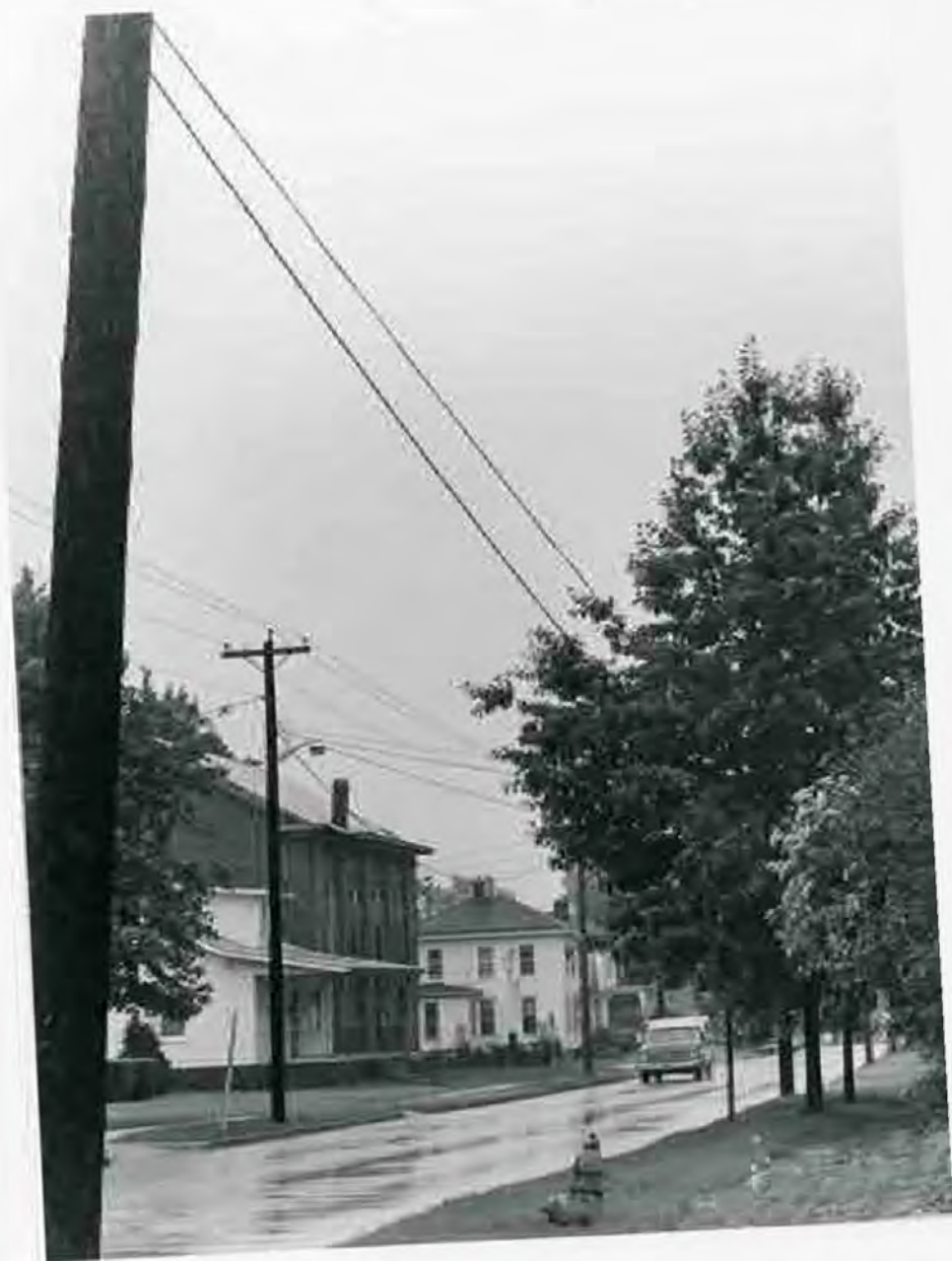
