



# WWII Valor in the Pacific National Monument, Tule Lake Unit




## TOURS AVAILABLE BY ADVANCE REQUEST

**Camp Tulelake tours meet at the camp entrance**, located on Hill Road approximately two miles north of the Klamath Basin Wildlife Refuges Visitor Center.



Camp Tulelake started as a Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) camp in the 1930s. This camp is only one of over 27 CCC camps in this area. During WWII, the camp housed a small group of Japanese Americans who had been interned at the War Relocation Center. Between 1944 and 1946 the camp was home to German and Italian Prisoners of War, who worked for local farmers throughout the Basin.

**Tule Lake Segregation Center tours meet at the Tulelake-Butte Valley Fairgrounds**, located on Main Street in Tulelake, CA.



The Tule Lake Segregation Center was one of 10 War Relocation Centers during WWII which housed persons of Japanese ancestry. After the loyalty questionnaire was distributed within the camps, Tule Lake became a Segregation Center where “disloyals” were sent. Tule Lake was the largest of the ten centers and was open the longest. It is also the only center that had a jail and stockade.
