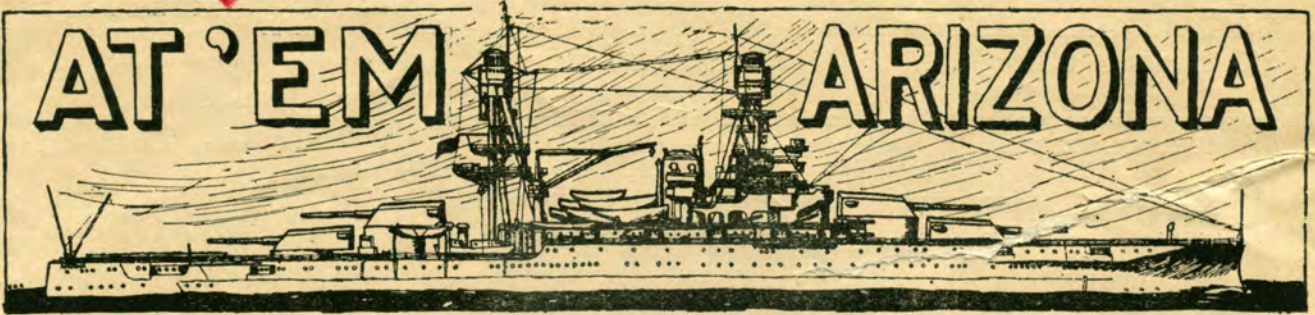
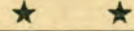

Dancing from 8:30 to 12 o'clock.

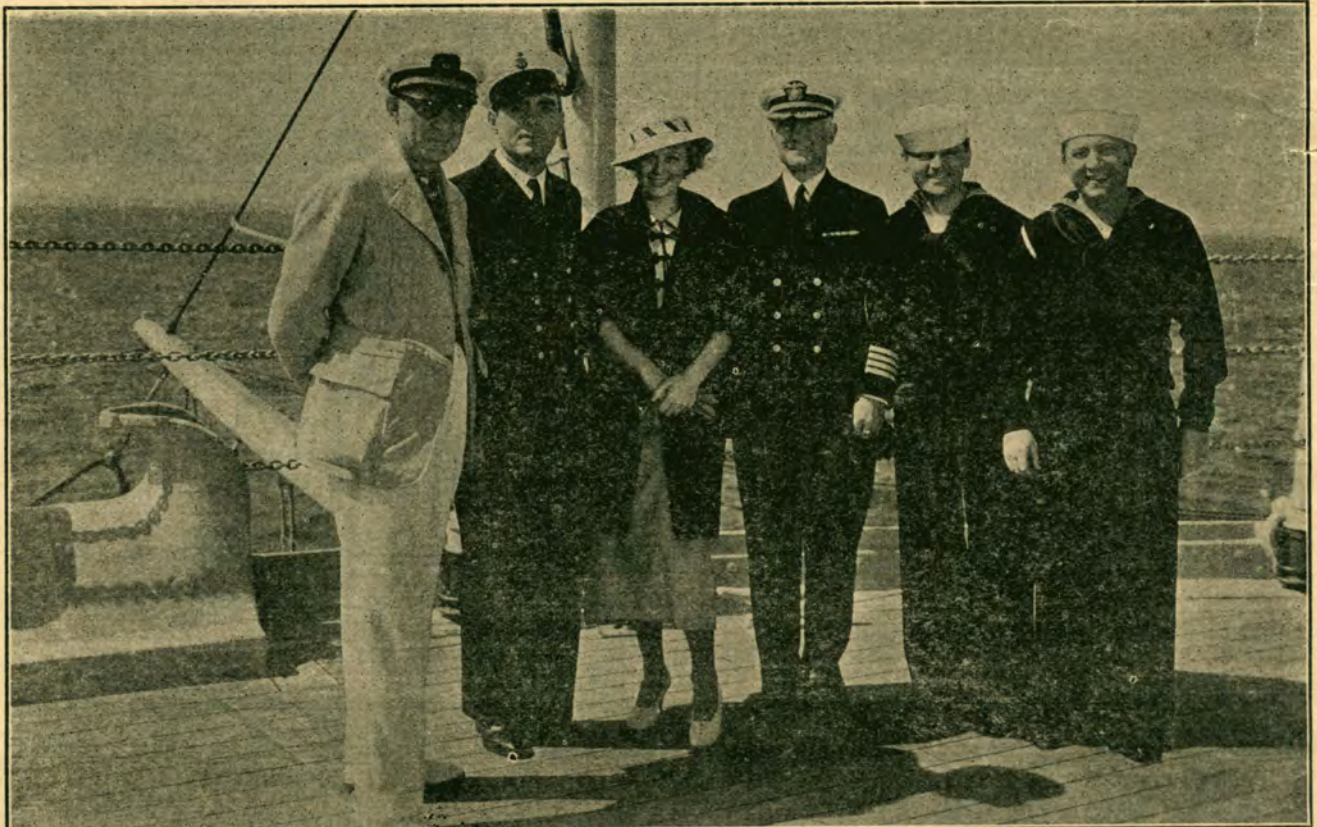
CPO'S ENTERTAIN STARS
