

DO 20

Germany has started work on an airliner of 6,400 h.p. for the North Atlantic air service.

It is being built at the Dornier works at Friedrichshafen, and will, it is claimed, be the largest airplane in the world. It will be known as the DO20.

Of the seaplane type, it will be driven by 8 motors (Diesel type) of 800 h.p. each. Each two motors will drive one propeller.

Dorner has just completed the DO 18, also for the North Atlantic service, and successful trial flights have already been carried out. This machine will first be operated on the mail service to South America, but will eventually be used on the North Atlantic route when that service is started.—British United Press.—Sunday Times, London.

TACOMA LEDGER CUTTER RACE
