U. S. S. Pennsylvania Hoists The Battle Efficiency Pennant.

The Battle Efficiency Pennent was formally hoisted on the U.S.S. Pennsylvania, Flagship of the Fourth Battleship Division, in accordance with orders of the Navy Department, on the morning of Tuesday. Sept. 4, 1923. Rear Admiral W. V. Pratt, Commander Division Four, read the orders awarding the highly prized Efficiency Pennant to the Pennsylvania for making the highest score in the Battleship class, during the competitive year 1922-1923.

Admiral R. E. Coontz, Commander-in-Chief, U. S. Fleet, presented the Pennant to Capt. J. F. Hines, Commanding officer of the Pennsylvania. Captain Hines spoke of the splendid and unremitting work performed by the officers and crew to secure the efficiency and standing of his ship; and the Efficiency Pennant was then run up to the fore truck of the "Pennsy."

Representatives of the other Ships present, including the Destroyer Squadrons, Battle Fleet, witnessed the ceremony.

The Pennsylvania made a remarkable record during the year just concluded, standing first in Engineering and Fifth in Gunnery; and consequently first in the final score for Battle Efficiency.

The Arizona heartily congratulates her Sister ship, and all hands are glad of the honors our Flagship has brought to this Division.

Our predictions and hopes for the coming year are that the Battle Efficiency Pennant will remain in the Fourth Division.



The U. S. S. Pecos, a tanker, was ordered to fill to capacity with fuel oil, general provisions, blankets and stores and to "take on board all Navy medical officers and medical supplies available" and to proceed with all speed to Yokohama. The Borie, a destroyer, arrived at Nagasaki on Sept. 4. to forma link in the radio relay chain.

The Stewart and five other destroyers proceeded at once to Yokohama. The Stewart is equipped with the Zonic depth finding appartus to take soundings in the harbor of Yokohama.

O. are awarded a money prize of \$5.00. Each man obtaining prize money is entitled of course to wear the coveted "E" on his sleeve.
