

The Legend of Kaʻahupāhau The Shark Goddess of Puʻuloa

On February 17, 1913, dry dock #1 structure rumbled, rocked and caved in. Workers had earlier complained how the dry dock was being built on the site of a temple once dedicated to Ka'ahupāhau, the Shark Goddess [who] had long before proclaimed that sorrow would come to anyone profaning the Pearl River basin and Pu'uloa (what we commonly call Pearl Harbor) today.



A worker on the dry dock named David Kanakeawe Richards...visited a local Kahuna, a priestess, who told him what should be done. Mr. Richards returned to Pearl Harbor and sprinkled wood and ashes over the dry dock as the Kahuna had instructed him, chanting in Hawaiian all the while. The Kahuna herself came by a few days later and after she had blessed the dry dock enterprise and appeared the goddess, she told Navy officials they would have no further trouble.




