Nothing could be truer at Weir Farm National Historic Site. The park draws so many visitors and artists of all ages regardless of the season and the major on-site restoration projects. We have completed the utility and fire suppression upgrades at the Weir House and studios and the exterior of the new Artist in Residence Studio. In 2010, we are focusing on the interiors and historic furnishings in the Weir House and studios. American Recovery and Reinvestment Act funding will go to much needed repairs to the exteriors of the two historic studios. Amazingly, and because of our great staff and volunteers we remain open to the public (weather permitting) as we continue on with these exciting preservation projects. Check out the tour schedule and plan a day to walk through the trees, hike to the pond, explore the trails and gardens, and just simply enjoy the great outdoors.

Next Generation of Park Stewards

Weir Farm National Historic Site and Groundwork Bridgeport experienced another successful summer working together to create the next generation of park stewards. The summer began with a stone wall workshop at the Kellogg Environmental Center and continued with several work projects at Weir Farm National Historic Site. The students had roles in managing the park's invasive species and maintaining the historic gardens and trails. Students were also exposed to the range of careers available in the National Park Service through a series of talks presented by

the park's superintendent, facility manager, museum specialist, horticulturist, and interpretive park rangers. They also were given time for art, aided by the instruction of professional artist Marc Chabot. As one Groundwork Bridgeport member, Brandon Holland, reflected: "When we finally got the chance to make art at Weir Farm, I was able to observe my surroundings and while I did that, everything seemed different. Everything seemed so calm and refreshing." Participant Carol Trinh commented: "Even though my art was hideous, I had an awesome day."

Conservation Corner

The beloved stag horn chandelier that presided over the Weir House dining room for decades is finally getting some much-needed cleaning. The chandelier has been at the Northeast Museum Services Center, where dense soot is being removed to reveal the carved woman's facial features and accurate paint colors. Conservators' research shows it to be related to a number of Bavarian chandeliers featuring carved figures with antlers, called *lusterweibchen* which range in date from the Middle Ages to the 1900s.

Two Days in September Currently on Exhibit

Weir Farm was described by artist Albert P. Ryder in 1897 as a place where “the landscape and the air are full of promise.” This attitude was one shared by many Impressionist artists of the time, and it kept them coming back to this rural farm, owned by their colleague, J. Alden Weir, to paint the rolling fields, stone walls, gardens, and meadows. In the spirit of this artistic tradition, Weir Farm National Historic Site held an Impressionist Painting Workshop for local artists over the weekend of September 19th and 20th. Led by fine artist Dmitri Wright, the workshop explored the techniques and methods of the Impressionist painters. “The information, unique environment and profound depth of knowledge and understanding were truly inspiring,” commented one workshop participant. Paintings from the workshop will be the subject of a new exhibit entitled *Two Days in September*. This exhibit will be on display in the Burlingham House Visitor Center November to March, Thursday through Sunday, from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.
