



Oak Bottom Campground Regulations

National Park Service regulations are designed not only for your safety but also for the preservation and protection of the park resources for future generations. Thank you for your cooperation.

1. Check-out time is noon. Check-in time is 2:00 pm.
2. Six people may stay in each site. Any visitors to your site must leave by the 10 pm quiet time.
3. Only one vehicle may park in the tent campground parking lot. Any extra vehicles must park in the overflow parking area next to the RV Campground. Sleeping in vehicles is not permitted.
4. All vehicles must display a valid park pass. \$5 Daily or \$10 Weekly passes may be purchased with cash or check at the fee envelope drop box in the campground store parking lot. To purchase a pass with a credit card, go to the Visitor Center at the corner of Highway 299 and Kennedy Memorial Drive.

Visitor Center hours: Summer 9 am – 6 pm Winter 10 am – 4 pm

5. All vehicles, including motorcycles and trailers, are prohibited from the tent sites and trails.
6. Anyone under the age of 18 years will not be issued a campsite unless a guardian is present at all times.
7. Oak Bottom developed areas are closed to all activities except camping between 10:00 pm and 6:00 am.
8. Quiet hours are between 10:00 pm and 6:00 am. No generators may be used during this time. Other noises, such as loud voices or music, are also prohibited after 10 pm.
9. Pets must be kept in a cage or on a leash no more than six feet in length at all times. Unattended pets are subject to impoundment and the owners may be issued a notice of violation. Dispose of pet waste in trash cans. Dogs are not allowed at the designated swim beach.
10. No firewood can be gathered in the campground area. Do not damage or remove vegetation. Do not put nails in trees.
11. Do not leave campfires unattended. Make sure that the fire is completely extinguished before you leave your site or go to sleep for the night.
12. All food, pet food, beverage containers, cosmetics, toiletries, cooking utensils, dishes, and other items with food odor must be locked inside the bear-proof storage locker or vehicle unless they are in immediate use.

Whiskeytown is BEAR COUNTRY. Bears that get human food sometimes become aggressive and dangerous and must be killed. You can prevent this by proper food storage.

Citations: \$150 for improper food storage; \$250 for feeding wild animals.

13. Alcohol is allowed at your camp site, but it is not permitted on the swim beach or in the picnic area.
14. In the RV camping area, no tents or ground fires are allowed.
15. Do not drain or dump waste material from your recreational vehicle on the ground. Go to the campground store to obtain a key for the sanitary dump station.
