THE RED RIVER MISSION SCHOOL

Located near present Winnipeg, Canada. The seven Oregon Indian boys taken east by the Hudson's Bay Company, attended this school, and here the first natives from west of the Rockies received Protestant Baptism. From West, *Substance of a Journal*, p. 155.

#### KA-OU-PU OR PAUL

From the drawing of G. P. Disosway copied from the original of William Walker and reproduced in *Christian Advocate*, March 1, 1833. Ka-ou-pu was a member of the Nez Perce delegation to St. Louis in 1831, where he sickened and died in November 1831, after being christened Paul by the Roman Catholics.
