**Job Description:** Ideas will be generated after consultation with the management team. Topics will be selected and the volunteer will create press releases for upcoming events, write stories for the website and for communication with local media outlets, communications with youth and senior organizations to create partnerships and volunteer projects or curricula for those groups. Creating opportunities for public conversation or debate in classrooms that fit into the NY curriculum. All final scripts/products will be reviewed and evaluated by the Chief of Interpretation and the Park Superintendent before posting or sending to media outlets.

**Benefits to the volunteer:** Personal enrichment and working within a national park setting. Assisting visitors in their understanding of the legacy of the 1848 Woman's Rights Convention and the Declaration of Sentiments. Improved public information skills, public relations skill, experience using social media to forge and strengthen new and existing relationships.

**Skills and Qualifications:** Social media skills including the ability to tweet, do facebook and other online media. Skill in writing for different media, text or releases. Willingness to do research, willingness to do interviews and answer questions on upcoming or past events.

**Time Commitment:** Time commitment will vary with topic and event needs could be ten or more hours per week. Ideally intern will provide assistance for a minimum of 6 months.
