Outstandingly Remarkable Values of a Wild and Scenic River

"It is hereby declared to be the policy of the United States that certain selected rivers of the Nation, which, with their immediate environments, possess outstandingly remarkable scenic, recreational, geologic, fish and wildlife, historic, cultural or other similar values, shall be preserved in free-flowing condition, and that they and their immediate environments shall be protected for the benefit and enjoyment of present and future generations." - Wild and Scenic Rivers Act of 1968

Outstandingly remarkable values (or ORVs) are defined by the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act as the unique characteristics that make a river worthy of special protection. Only one ORV is required for a river to be designated into the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System. Outstandingly remarkable values of the Tuolumne River were first identified in 1979 and are being updated during this planning process.

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Outstandingly remarkable values of a river can include natural and cultural resources, such as vegetation, wildlife, geology, hydrology, scenery, recreation, American Indian traditional values, archeology, and historic features, provided that these values are both:

- *Rare, unique, or exemplary* in a regional or national context.
